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## Board of Nursing Statement of Philosophy

It is the philosophy of the Kentucky Board of Nursing that the regulation of the practice of nursing shall achieve public protection by ensuring the competency of licensees who provide nursing care. To that end, the regulation of nursing should be responsive to the changing health application of knowledge, skills, and behavior to meet those needs and priorities. As public protection is the essential role of the Board, the public should have a voice in the action taken to promote its protection.

Licensure establishes an essential level of competency, and indicates that nurses have a common core of knowledge. As such, the purpose of licensure is to set standards for practice and education of individuals in order to protect the public from dishonest and incompetent practitioners. These standards are established in the *Kentucky Nursing Laws* (Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314) and its attendant administrative regulations. Nursing practice and behavior inconsistent with these standards should lead to disciplinary action.

Critical elements of the regulation of nursing practice include a coherent, generally acceptable definition of nursing, as well as definitions of professional scope and accountability. These definitions should make explicit that the nurse is responsible and accountable for the practice of nursing according to individual preparation and experience, with nursing auxiliaries assisting under prescribed conditions. Further, the licensed nurse is responsible and accountable for continued professional learning throughout her/his career continuum.

Essential components of the regulation of prelicensure nursing education include sufficient, qualified faculty and appropriate program curricula and clinical practice laboratories. The curricula should reflect the activities, functions, duties, and responsibilities of the practicing nurse. The clinical practice laboratories should allow prelicensure students opportunities to both generate new knowledge and demonstrate their practice abilities.

As the standards governing nursing practice, continuing education, and prelicensure education are established through the legislative process, the Board has a responsibility to maintain ongoing communication with the legislative branch of government. Concurrently, the complex and dynamic changes occurring in the health care delivery system require that effective communication be maintained with licensees and with local, state and national nursing organizations, health care providers and agencies, governmental units, and nursing education programs.

In summary, the Kentucky Board of Nursing believes that the protection of the public can best be accomplished through ensuring the competency of licensees who provide nursing care, and by establishing standards that allow for the fullest development of nursing practice, commensurate with its potential social contribution.

Adopted: August 1990

Kentucky Administrative Regulations are enacted to operationalize statutory language and carry force and effect of law. Several regulations were revised during FY 94-95 as indicated by the effective date.

## Kentucky Administrative Regulations

## MISSION

The mission of the Commonwealth of Kentucky Board of Nursing is to enforce public policy related to the safe and effective practice of nursing in the interest of public welfare. As a regulatory agency of state government, the Board of Nursing accomplishes this mission as authorized by *Kentucky Revised Statutes* and attendant administrative regulations. In accomplishing its aims, the Board of Nursing licenses and registers qualified nurses and advanced registered nurse practitioners, approves providerships for mandatory continuing education and prelicensure programs of nursing, enforces the *Kentucky Nursing Laws*, and issues nursing practice opinions. In addition, the Board of Nursing cooperates with individuals, groups, organizations, and other state and national entities by the provision of appropriate services to promote safe and effective nursing care for the citizens of the Commonwealth.

## GOALS AND ASSUMPTIONS

**GOAL I:** *Ensure that persons licensed as nurses and registered as advanced registered nurse practitioners in Kentucky are qualified according to requirements to provide the citizens of the Commonwealth with safe and effective nursing care.*

### ASSUMPTIONS:

1. Method of licensure examination administration will change.
2. More practice complaints will be reported.
3. Registered nursing practice will expand to include current scopes of advanced nursing practice.
4. Emphasis on determination of competency will continue.
5. Questioning of mandatory continuing education for validation of competency will increase.
6. Changes in educational requirements for licensure will occur.
7. Scope of nursing practice will expand for licensees.
8. Nursing curricula will change to reflect non-traditional delivery systems.
9. Prelicensure educational programs will require an internship/preceptorship component.
10. There will be an increased societal interest in the arena of infectious diseases.
11. The role of regulatory agencies will be affected by the 1991 Americans With Disabilities Act.
12. Geopolitical events will dictate new approaches to the credentialing of foreign candidates for professional and occupational licensure.

**GOAL II:** *Optimize human and fiscal resources to improve services and control costs.*

### ASSUMPTIONS:

1. Automation will enhance Board operation.
2. Nurse manpower data will be valued and used.
3. An increase in fees or identification of other sources of revenue to maintain current level of services will be needed.

## LONG RANGE PLAN 1993-1997 (Continued)

4. Difficulty for nurses and consumers to serve on KBN relative to time, energy, and conflicts will occur.
5. Changes in educational requirements for licensure will have ramifications for Board composition.

**GOAL III: Assert leadership in state government and the public arena in the regulation of nurses, nursing education, and nursing practice to promote the delivery of safe and effective nursing services.**

### ASSUMPTIONS:

1. Shortages of nursing manpower will intensify.
2. Qualified students will select other professions.
3. A resurgence of monitoring KBN activities by other groups will occur.
4. The need for education regarding issues surrounding the regulation of nursing will continue.
5. Kentucky nurses will gain national prominence.
6. More nurses will be in independent practice.
7. The number of nurses employed outside of hospitals will increase.
8. Increase in non-licensed persons performing nursing duties will continue.
9. Efforts to implement institutional licensure will resurface.
10. Kentucky Legislature will consider reorganization of state government.
11. Inaccessibility of health care for citizens will jeopardize public safety.
12. Corporate control of health care delivery systems will expand.
13. The expansion of interdisciplinary approaches to health care delivery will impact and change the role and practice of nurse licensees.





#### Organization

The Governor appoints an **Advisory Council** to the board from nominees submitted by health related organizations. The council functions in an advisory capacity only as a constructive force in establishing and maintaining standards of nurse competency and licensure regulations in the interest of public protection.

Related organizations nominate representatives for membership on the **Advanced Registered Nurse Practice Council**, as an advisory body to the Board of Nursing. 

**FY 94-95: TOTAL OPERATING FUND = \$3,784,990**



The Kentucky Board of Nursing is a fee supported agency. No general revenue tax dollars are expended by the agency. The operating fund for FY 94-95 was \$3,784,990 with expenditures totaling \$1,639,227. The FY 94-95 Financial Report and Fee Schedule are illustrated.

Various Board of Nursing publications and informational material were offered for a nominal fee that covered duplicating costs. Some of the publications available for purchase were the KBN History, *Kentucky Nursing Laws*, KBN Administrative Regulations, KBN Advisory Opinion Statements, and Disciplinary Process and Procedures for Nursing Licensure. A free brochure on continuing education was also available.

## Continuing Education

As a mechanism to promote continuing competency, the *Kentucky Nursing Laws* (KRS 314.073) mandate that licensees earn a minimum of 30 hours of approved nursing continuing education, including at least 2 hours of Kentucky Cabinet for Human Resources (CHR) approved AIDS education (KRS 214.610). The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the Commonwealth agency legally authorized to approve providers of mandatory continuing education.

The post-renewal audit process is used to verify earning of the required 30 contact hours including the 2 hours of CHR approved AIDS education. The random audit requires that those persons selected show documented evidence (certificate of attendance, transcript, grade report, etc.) of approved contact hour earning during the applicable licensure period. Of those licensees randomly selected for the audit process, 99% demonstrated compliance with the CE requirements. Those not complying were referred for disciplinary action.


The *Kentucky Nursing Laws* provide that the Board of Nursing may "deny, limit, revoke, probate or suspend any license to practice nursing issued by the Board or applied for . . . or to otherwise discipline a licensee or to deny admission to the licensure examination, or to require evidence of evaluation and therapy . . . ."

The Board continues its efforts to make the public aware of the investigatory and disciplinary procedures and to emphasize the legal requirement to, and importance of, reporting nurses who are suspected of engaging in unsafe or illegal practices.

## Nursing Practice

The Board interprets the legal scope of nursing practice according to *Kentucky Revised Statutes* Chapter 314 and Board of Nursing administrative regulations in the determination of safe and effective nursing care for the citizens of the Commonwealth. In response to inquiries requesting interpretation of the legal scope of nursing practice, the Board has published formal advisory opinion statements as guidelines for safe practice (see the chart at right), as well as issuing other opinions on nursing practice issues.

During FY 94-95, the Board addressed the following inquiries regarding nursing practice: Physical examinations by RNs; external jugular vein access by RNs; administration of continuous epidural infusions by RNs; performance of nursing tasks by unlicensed assistive personnel (UAP) operating room circulator; roles of nurses in documentation and training; care of patients' postangioplasty/stent placement; school nursing practice; administration of immunizations by LPNs in a health department setting; administration of oxygen in an emergency situation by RNs; performance of dialysis by LPNs; delegation of tasks to respiratory therapists and radiological technologists by RNs; pulse oximetry—nursing assessment tool; and use of intravenous syringe pump systems by LPNs.

## Nursing Incentive Scholarship Fund

The Nursing Incentive Scholarship Fund (NISF) provides scholarships to Kentucky residents who will be attending in-state approved prelicensure nursing programs (registered nurse or practical nurse) or in-state graduate nursing programs. To be eligible for consideration, an applicant must have a designated sponsor (health care facility or educational institution) who matches any NISF monies awarded in return for the applicant's service upon completion of the educational program.

Due to the reduced demand for licensed nurses in the workplace and the resulting decrease in sponsor participation, the eligible NISF applicant pool significantly decreased in FY 94-95.



## Prelicensure Programs of Nursing

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the legally authorized body in the Commonwealth to approve programs of nursing preparing persons for eligibility for licensure as nurses. Through the provisions of the *Kentucky Nursing Laws* (KRS 314.011, 314.031, 314.111 and 314.131), the Board prescribes standards for educational institutions offering programs which prepare candidates for licensure as nurses. These standards include provisions for consultation, survey visits, review of Annual Reports and Faculty Summaries, monitoring of fiscal year licensure examination pass rates, and requests for and review of other special reports.

## NCLEX Pass Rates

With the April 1994 implementation of computer adaptive technology, eligible licensure candidates may schedule the NCLEX examination at a time of personal preference. Unless requested otherwise, all candidates are scheduled to test within a maximum of 45 days of requesting a testing appointment at the testing center of choice.

Since NCLEX testing is now on a demand basis, the reporting of pass rates by programs of nursing is based upon the numbers of graduates from a program of nursing during a fiscal year (i.e., July 1, 1994 through June 30, 1995) who test prior to January 1 of the subsequent fiscal year (i.e., 1996).

## Kentucky Nurse Licensees

The Board's mission of public protection is accomplished through the licensure and registration of those applicants who meet statutory and regulatory requirements. KRS 314.031 states "It shall be unlawful for any person to call or hold himself out as or use the title of nurse or to practice or offer to practice as a nurse unless licensed under the provision of KRS 314 . . . ." The *Kentucky Nursing Laws* provide that "The license of every person under the provisions of KRS 314 . . . shall be renewed at least biennially . . . ." 201 Kentucky Administrative Regulation 20:080 states that the licensure period shall be November 1 to October 31.

Licenses issued by the Kentucky Board of Nursing are titled "registered nurse" (RN) and "licensed practical nurse" (LPN). Active licensure status grants recipients the privilege to practice nursing in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Inactive status allows the use of the licensure title but prohibits the practice of nursing in the Commonwealth. During FY 94-95, there were 40,298 registered nurse licenses renewed (36,586 active and 3,712 inactive) and 15,021 practical nurse licenses renewed (13,741 active and 1,280 inactive).





## ARNP Registrations

Since 1978, *Kentucky Revised Statutes* 314.131(1) empower the Board to register and designate those persons qualified to engage in advanced nursing practice. KRS 314.011(6) and (7) define "advanced registered nurse practitioner" and "advanced registered nursing practice," respectively. The Kentucky Board of Nursing registers qualified individuals as advanced registered nurse practitioners (ARNP) designated either as nurse anesthetist, nurse-midwife, nurse practitioner, or nurse clinical specialist.




## Licensure By Endorsement



The *Kentucky Nursing Laws* (KRS 314.041(4) and 314.051(5) authorize the Board to issue licenses to practice nursing in the Commonwealth to those nurses who have ". . . passed the examination prescribed by the Board or its equivalent and been licensed . . . under the laws of another state, territory, or foreign country, if in the opinion of the Board, the applicant is qualified to practice professional nursing in this state." During FY 94-95, a total of 1,102 registered nurses and 290 practical nurses were granted active Kentucky nurse licensure via endorsement from another state, territory, or foreign country.
