The Kentucky Board of Nursing appreciates the opportunity of serving the people of Kentucky and the Board and staff members wish to express gratitude to the many individuals and groups whose interest, cooperation and support assist in achieving sound regulatory practices in the interest of public protection for the citizens of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

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BOARD OF NURSING COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the state government agency, under the authority of Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314, designated to approve, regulate, and control nursing education and practice, to examine and license qualified graduates of approved schools of nursing, to license qualified nurse applicants and to register and designate qualified advanced registered nurse practitioner applicants.

To fulfill the statutory mission of the Board of Nursing, four major goals with objectives for each were delineated at the onset of the 1980-82 Biennium. The first year of the biennium can be described as a highly productive one for the Kentucky Board of Nursing members and staff as the activities to accomplish the mission, goals and objectives are summarized in the 1980-1981 ANNUAL REPORT of the Board of Nursing.

GOAL I INSURE THAT PERSONS LICENSED AS NURSES IN KENTUCKY ARE QUALIFIED ACCORDING TO LICENSURE REQUIREMENTS TO PROVIDE THE CITIZENS OF THE COMMONWEALTH WITH SAFE AND COMPETENT CARE.

OBJECTIVES

- 1. Continue process for approval of schools of nursing and clinical facilities to promote competency of new graduates.
- 2. License and register nurses meeting requirements for licensure to protect the public.
- 3. Improve process for investigation and resolution of complaints to protect public from incompetent nurses.
- 4. Monitor licensure status of employed nurses for public protection.
- 5. Deny, probate, suspend or revoke licenses of incompetent nurses or nurses who have negligently or willfully acted in a manner inconsistent with the practice of nursing, to protect the public.
- 6. Determine and study need for "limited license" for public protection.

As is typical nationally, Kentucky is challenged to provide an adequate number of qualified nurses; therefore, there is a high degree of interest in nursing education in the Commonwealth. A letter of intent to establish a nursing program for licensed practical nurses to achieve an associate degree in nursing was received from Sullivan Junior College of Business, Louisville; and a letter of intent to establish a new practical nursing program was received from Region Fourteen Vocational-Technical School, Somerset.

Activities to accomplish Goal I included the review and the approval of annual reports, annual faculty lists, and lists of clinical facilities of all nursing education programs preparing nurses for licensure as registered nurses and licensed practical nurses. Schools of nursing found not to be in compliance with the regulations and policies of the Board were required to study and analyze the area of noncompliance and submit plans for compliance. An increase in percentage of pass rate on the licensing examination by the program graduates was noted from the previous year (1979-1980). Consultation was provided to the schools of nursing by visits, correspondence and telephone conversations. Two meetings were held with faculties of individual schools of nursing to explain the new test plan for the comprehensive licensing examination to be implemented in June, 1982.

The vigilant efforts of the KBN School Committee expedited the Board's determination of schools of nursing being in compliance with regulations and assisted the work to maintain and improve standards of the educational programs.

The public protection mission of the Board of Nursing was continued by the licensure and registration of nurses meeting requirements. Two Kentucky Administrative Regulations prescribing requirements for the registration and designation of advanced registered nurse practitioners and for licensure of nurses by endorsement were approved and implemented. The latter regulation included evidence of current competency to be licensed in Kentucky. For the first time, nurses with lapsed licenses were required to participate in continuing education activities or a Board approved nursing refresher program prior to being issued an active license. Graduates of foreign nursing schools are required to successfully complete the Commission on Graduates of Foreign Nursing Schools examination prior to being eligible for the licensure examination in Kentucky. To be consistent with the U.S. Department of Labor and the U.S. Department of Justice regulations and with the 1978 revision of Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314, revisions were initiated on the regulations for licensure of nurses by examination and for licensure of nurses by endorsement.

Statistics on licenses and registrations issued show the number of licensed practical nurses, registered nurses and advanced registered nurse practitioners had increased over the previous period.

The Board of Nursing adopted the use of hearing panels to expedite the administrative processes and procedures for disciplinary actions. Empowered by Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 218A, the Board imposed fines for the first time as part of disciplinary action. Licenses issued on probation were stamped to indicate that licensure status.

The licensure of employed nurses was monitored by checking over 1400 lists of employed licensees submitted by employers after both the registered nurse and licensed practical nurse licensure renewal periods. This mechanism has been highly effective to insure that employers check the license of a nurse to determine qualifications for practice prior to employment.

An Ad Hoc Committee on Legislation was constituted to study and determine the need for "limited license". The committee was composed of board members and representatives of nursing organizations. A limited license could be issued to handicapped but otherwise qualified applicants for licensure and to persons disciplined by the Board and it has the potential to increase the number of persons employed as nurses while at the same time safeguarding the public by limiting the practice permitted by the person holding such a license.

GOAL II IMPLEMENT A QUALITY PROGRAM OF MANDATORY CONTINUING EDUCATION FOR RELICENSURE OF NURSES.

OBJECTIVES

- 1. Approve providers of continuing education for nurses.
- 2. Approve agents for reviewing programs/offerings of continuing education for nurses.
- 3. Approve programs/offerings of continuing education to meet requirements for relicensure of nurses.
- 4. Test and implement procedures for recording and monitoring contact hours earned to meet requirements for relicensure.
- 5. Assess approved review agents and providers' compliance with Board standards and criteria.

Two years of preparatory work assisted with the implementation of a quality mandatory continuing education program for relicensure of nurses. Mandatory continuing education requirements are effective for the first time with renewal of 1982 licenses. The first phase of implementing mandatory continuing education was realized with

the approval of Kentucky Administrative Regulations for continuing education. The six regulations were implemented in the Fall of 1980 and provided the mechanism for the Board to approve providers and programs/offerings of continuing education for nurses. A manual of the Standards and Criteria for Mandatory Continuing Education for Nurses was adopted by the Board and made available to nurses and potential providers of mandatory continuing education. Procedures were developed for gaining credit for continuing education contact hours earned in out-of-state offerings and by academic credit. The KBN Continuing Education Committee worked diligently in assisting the Board to implement the new program as expeditiously as possible.

All nurses were notified of mandatory continuing education requirements by receipt of the QUARTERLY mailed first class to all current active and inactive licensees. Brochures to provide information about mandatory continuing education were printed and distributed. The approval processes for providers and programs/offerings of continuing education were explained and discussed at six (6) workshops held in various locations of the Commonwealth. In addition, the Board and staff members met with groups upon request to discuss the requirements for mandatory continuing education.

To monitor the Board agents and providers' compliance with Standards and Criteria for Mandatory Continuing Education and to insure the quality of each approved offering, the provider must submit to the Board a summary of participant evaluations within four (4) weeks after presentation. The Board may conduct audits and on-site visits to investigate complaints or low ratings on summary evaluations. As part of the continued provider approval mechanism, each provider must submit a self-evaluation at the conclusion of the first year programming (February 1, 1982).

GOAL III OPTIMIZE EFFICIENCY OF BOARD AND OFFICE OPERATIONS TO IMPROVE SERVICES AND CONTROL OF EXPENDITURES.

OBJECTIVES

- 1. Recruit qualified and competent persons for vacant nursing education consultant staff positions.
- 2. Study and analyze functions and organization of Board staff.
- 3. Study and analyze procedures to implement Board policy and regulations.
- 4. Finalize Board committee structure.
- 5. Study and analyze Board decision making process within a committee structure.
- 6. Continue orientation of staff and Board members to policies and procedures.
- 7. Monitor and maintain control of expenditures within budgetary allocations.
- 8. Utilize present computer capabilities.
- 9. Compile current policy manuals for areas of function.

Staff were recruited utilizing the handicap employment program as well as other state government mechanisms. A qualified and competent individual was appointed to the nursing education consultant position for continuing education and recruitment for appointment to the vacant nursing education consultant position for schools of nursing was being finalized at the end of the year.

A study and analysis of the organization and functions of the Board staff resulted in recommendations for reorganization and reclassification of staff positions to reflect more accurately the responsibilities and functions of each position. Positions were upgraded according to the recommendations of the Department of Personnel and recommendations for further reclassification and retitling to better describe staff positions and requirements were in process at the end of the year. With the assistance of staff of the Department of Personnel, all position descriptions were reviewed and functions identified to write accurate position descriptions and job specifications. A position description for the executive director with an annual evaluation procedure was accepted by the Board and implemented.

Each standing committee of the Board was evaluated and recommendations were made regarding purpose, composition and function to expedite the Board decision making process within committee structure. Orientation plans were developed for both staff and Board members to assist in understanding procedures, policies and regulations.

Studies and analyses of procedures for recording and monitoring contact hours earned to meet requirements for relicensure and of other procedures to implement Board policies and regulations were completed with the conclusion that the present computer capabilities were inadequate. With the recommendation of state government personnel, the Board directed that an automated system be implemented by the end of Summer, 1981. In conjunction with the automated system, supervisory staff compiled current policy manuals for specific areas of function within the office operation.

Staff of the Department of Library and Archives reviewed the system for permanent records relative to microfilming and hard copies. The centralized services of the Department of Library and Archives were utilized to insure quality and secure records. Other services of state government to assist in the efficiency of office operations included participation in the uniform payroll system, installation of a new telephone system and an audit of the financial records by the staff of the Office of State Auditor. As reported by the latter, the financial records of the Board were found to be in order with recommendations given to improve office procedures according to new state government policies and procedures.

Despite increased costs, the Board was able to operate within the 1980-81 budget approved by the Kentucky General Assembly. As recommended by the auditors, work was initiated to develop a regulation on a fee schedule. The finances of the Board continue to be monitored carefully by the KBN Finance Committee as implementation of all the programs progress.

GOAL IV ASSERT LEADERSHIP IN STATE GOVERNMENT, NURSING EDUCATION, NURSING PRACTICE AND THE PUBLIC ARENA TO PROMOTE THE DELIVERY OF SAFE AND EFFECTIVE NURSING SERVICES.

OBJECTIVES

- 1. Communicate with nurses, state agencies, organizations, employers of nurses and the public at large the regulations and policies adopted for public protection and welfare.
- 2. Initiate revision of the Nurse Practice Act to better protect the public.
- 3. Continue active participation as a member Board of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing.
- 4. Cooperate with local, state and national organizations and agencies involved in health data collection and planning manpower needs.
- 5. Provide consultation services to schools of nursing to improve educational practices.
- 6. Assist groups and organizations to assess nurses' needs for continuing education.
- 7. Work with groups and organizations to promote availability and accessability of continuing education for nurses.
- 8. Adopt administrative regulations on standards of nursing practice.

To keep nurses and employers of nurses and other interested individuals and groups apprised of the activities, regulations and policies of the Board, the QUARTERLY newsletter was published four (4) times during the year. The Board continued to participate actively as a member board of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing and by representation to the Subcommittee on Nursing to the staff of the Council on Higher Education, the Kentucky Council of Associate Degree Nursing, the

Department of Human Resources-Kentucky Nurses Association Committee on Nursing, the Kentucky Nurses Association Board of Directors, the KNA Commission on Education, KNA Commission on Continuing Education and the Kentucky State Association of Licensed Practical Nurses.

As in the past, the Board cooperated with local, state and national organizations and agencies involved with health data collection for planning manpower needs. In particular, the planning efforts of the Council on Higher Education and the Office of Health and Vital Statistics were augmented by the data collected with applications for renewal of licenses. The name and address lists of licensees were made available to those individuals and groups meeting the criteria set by the Board to protect the privacy of individual licensees. The Board honors the request of any nurse who indicates in writing to withhold the release of his/her name and address.

The membership of the KBN School Committee and the KBN Continuing Education Committee includes representation from those regulated. These committee meetings and those held with the Nurse Practice Council and the Advisory Council of the Board enhanced the Board's decision making process by providing a wider spectrum of input. The Nurse Practice Council was instrumental in assisting with the promulgation of the regulations for advanced registered nurse practitioners and for the scopes and standards of practice of advanced registered nurse practitioners. The latter will be reviewed by the Legislative Research Commission Administrative Regulation Review Subcommittee in August, 1981.

The Board and staff members provided consultation services to schools of nursing to improve educational practices, and meetings were held with over one-hundred (100) groups and organizations to promote availability and accessibility of continuing education for nurses. Likewise, consultation with the Advisory Council of the Board assisted with implementation of regulations of the Board.

Through the efforts of the Ad Hoc Committee on Legislation, the Board initiated proposed revisions to Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314 to better protect the public. The revisions included both administrative and substantive changes involving limited licensure, requirements for registration and designation of advanced registered nurse practitioners, biennial renewal of licenses, authority for imposing fees and entering into contractual relationships, requirements for reporting possible violations with delineation of acts violating the law, civil fines and injunction authority. A first draft was approved for consideration by nursing and other interested groups.

The Kentucky General Assembly has authority to evaluate state government agencies which are created by law. To that end, the Legislative Interim Joint Committee on Business Organizations and Professions constituted a Subcommittee on Licensing and Regulation to evaluate state government agencies dealing with licensing and regulation. The Kentucky Board of Nursing was one of the first regulatory agencies to be evaluated. Upon completion of the evaluation, the Subcommittee reported to the Interim Joint Committee on Business Organizations and Professions that the Board of Nursing be given a favorable recommendation with no further action at that time. Subsequently, the Interim Joint Committee approved the recommendation on the Board of Nursing evaluation.

In summary, the active involvement of Board members in directing a responsive staff has facilitated accomplishing the mission of the Board of Nursing in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Information on Board and staff member activities and statistics included in this report demonstrate the effectiveness of the Board operation as was noted by the legislative evaluative review during the past year.

The Board met seven times during the year 1980-81 for a total of fourteen days.

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APPROVED NURSING EDUCATION PROGRAMS

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the legally authorized body in Kentucky to approve schools or programs of nursing preparing persons for eligibility for licensure as nurses. Under the provisions of KRS 314.011, 314.031, 314.111 and 314.131, the Board prescribes standards for schools of nursing and courses preparing persons for licensure as nurses. It provides for surveys of schools and approves schools and courses which meet the requirements of the law, regulations and policies.

At the present, there are five (5) generic baccalaureate programs, twenty (20) associate degree, one (1) diploma and fifteen (15) practical nursing programs. In contrast, sixteen years ago, there were four (4) generic baccalaureate programs, nine (9) associate degree, eleven (11) diploma and fifteen (15) practical nursing programs.

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the legally authorized body in Kentucky to approve Providers of mandatory continuing education for nurses. Under the provisions of KRS 314.073, the Board prescribes standards for Providers of mandatory continuing education, as well as standards for offerings/programs which meet the requirements of the law, regulations and policies.

Within the standards prescribed by the Board, two (2) established professional nursing organizations were approved by the Board for mandatory continuing education programming review. These organizations and their responsibility are:

BOARD AGENT: The Kentucky Nurses' Association

RESPONSIBILITY: To review according to Board standards and criteria,

programming of Providers which has been designed for target audiences including registered nurses and

make recommendations to the Board.

BOARD AGENT: The National Federation of Licensed Practical Nurses

There are ninety two (92) Providers of mandatory continuing education located within the Commonwealth and three (3) located out-of-state, for a total of ninety five (95) Providers of mandatory continuing education for Kentucky nurse licensees. These Providers are classified according to type of agency. Current data reveal the following categorical breakdown of approved Providers of mandatory continuing education for nurses: Professional Nursing Organizations (7); Educational Institutions (21); Health Service Agencies (54); Health Related Organizations (6); and Other (7).

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LICENSURE BY ENDORSEMENT

KRS 314.041(4) states "The board may issue a license to practice nursing as a registered nurse to an applicant who has passed the state board test pool exam or an equivalent examination approved by the board and been licensed as a registered nurse under the laws of another state, territory or foreign country if in the opinion of the board the applicant is qualified to practice professional nursing in this state."

KRS 314.051(5) states "The board may issue a license to practice as a licensed practical nurse to any applicant who has passed the state board test pool exam or an equivalent examination approved by the board and has been licensed or registered as a licensed practical nurse or a person licensed to perform similar services under a different title, under the laws of another state, territory or foreign country if, in the opinion of the board, the applicant meets the requirements for a licensed practical nurse in this state."

KRS 314.101(3) states "A temporary work permit may be issued by the board to persons who have completed the requirements for, applied for and paid the fee for licensure by examination or endorsement. Temporary work permits shall be issued only for the length of time required to process applications for endorsement or to conduct and determine the results of examinations and shall not be renewed. No temporary work permit shall be issued to an applicant who has failed the licensure examination."

The Kentucky Nurse Practice Act provides "The license of every person under the provisions of KRS 314 ... shall be annually renewed ..."

By administrative regulation KAR 20:080 the Kentucky Board of Nursing has determined that the annual year for the registered nurse shall be May 1 - April 30 and November 1 - October 31 for the licensed practical nurse. KRS 314.031 states "It shall be unlawful for any person to call or hold himself out as or use the title of nurse or to practice of offer to practice as a nurse unless licensed under the provision of KRS 314 ..."

INVESTIGATION AND DISCIPLINARY ACTION

The Kentucky Nurse Practice Act provides that the Board of Nursing may "deny, revoke, probate or suspend any license to practice nursing issued by the Board or applied for ... or to otherwise discipline a licensee" if an individual is in violation of the nursing law.

The K.B.N. employs a nurse investigator and all complaints and inquiries concerning individual practice are referred to this office.

The Board has continued in its efforts to make the public aware of the investigatory and disciplinary procedures and to emphasize the importance of reporting nurses who are engaging in unsafe or illegal practices.

Sixteen (16) hearings were held for licensees and/or applicants and resulted in the following actions:
