PREFACE

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the state government agency authorized by Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314, to approve, regulate, and control nursing education and practice, to examine and license qualified graduates of approved schools of nursing, to license qualified nurse applicants, and to register and designate qualified advanced registered nurse practitioner applicants.

To provide guidance in fulfilling the statutory mission of the Board of Nursing, four major goals with attendant objectives were delineated at the onset of 1982-84 Biennium. These goals and objectives are found on pages 48-50 of this Report. The 1982-83 ANNUAL REPORT of the Board of Nursing summarizes the activities carried out by the Board to accomplish its mission, goals, and objectives. The major programs and activities of the Board of Nursing are described and include: nursing education, mandatory continuing education, nursing practice, credentials and licensure, disciplinary investigation and action, regulations and policies of the Board, office operation, and state and national involvement. Information is also provided on the Board structures and finances.

Information provided throughout this 1982-83 ANNUAL REPORT of the Board of Nursing shows the depth and scope of the activities of the Board members and staff and highlights the multi-faceted activities and involvements of the Board of Nursing. The Report information documents that the Board of Nursing is accomplishing its statutory mission to protect the public by licensing and registering only those nurses who are competent and effective as nurse licensees. The goals and objectives, adopted for the 1982-84 Biennium, have provided direction for the continued development and implementation of sound regulatory practice in the interest of public protection for the citizens of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The projections for the 1983-84 year of the Biennium offer a challenge to the Board and staff members to continue fulfilling the statutory mission of the Board of Nursing.

PART I

COMPOSITION OF BOARD, COMMITTEES, COUNCILS AND STAFF

Board of Nursing - Structures and Operations

The standing and ad-hoc committees of the Board, serving in an advisory capacity, continued to expedite the Board decision making process. The composition of the committees included non-Board members in order to gain appropriate input from interested parties.

A policy on the use of general consent was adopted for all written recommendations submitted to the Board by officers, committees, councils, representatives, and staff. The use of the general consent procedure for all matters except disciplinary actions resulted in less time being required for Board meetings, although more matters were considered.

As a state government agency, the Board is required to hold all meetings in open session, with the few exceptions noted in the open meetings law. The open meetings were advertised in the Board communications with licensees and the public, and increased numbers of visitors have attended meetings of the Board and its committees and councils during the year. The Board adopted Rules for Conduct of Meetings in order to facilitate the work of the Board, committees, and councils and to provide those persons in attendance with understanding of the conduct of meetings.

Because of the expanding scope and volume of functions of the Board relative to investigations and nursing practice issues, two additional budgeted staff positions were filled. Qualified individuals were appointed to the nursing practice consultant and clerical support staff positions. Staff for new and replacement positions were recruited using state government mechanisms.

The ongoing study and analysis of the organization and functions of the Board staff resulted in the organization of the staff into three major branches. In addition, the Work Planning and Performance Review System was implemented.

The Unified and Integrated System of Accounts was implemented and staff of the Board office were trained in the use of the new system. The finances of the Board continued to be monitored carefully in view of the increased scope and volume of functions, new costs for services as part of state government, and ongoing inflationary costs. The finances were projected for a five year period and the budget for the 1982-83 fiscal year and for the upcoming year were studied.

A large unanticipated expenditure for capital outlay was required when the automated system installed in late 1981 was found to be inadequate relative to computer equipment. This expenditure, combined with increased salary costs caused by two salary grade range adjustments and the performance merit pay, required an increase in the Board maximum allocation for budget expenditures.

An Opinion of the Attorney General directed the Board of Nursing to release the names and addresses of licensees to those parties who request and are willing to pay the costs for such lists or labels of licensee names and addresses. PART II

BOARD OF NURSING INVOLVEMENTS AND LEADERSHIP ACTIVITIES

Board Involvements and Leadership Activities

The 1978 and 1982 revisions to Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314 required that the Board of Nursing communicate with those individuals and groups affected by the many changes instituted by these revisions. To keep nurses, employers of nurses, and other interested individuals and groups apprised of the activities, regulations, and policies of the Board, the Board newsletter circulation was expanded. Previously, the newsletter was published four times during a given year with only one issue being sent to all licensees. The title of the newsletter was changed from the QUARTERLY to the KBN COMMUNIQUE' and is being sent semiannually to all nurses who hold current licensure on either active or inactive status. Employers of nurses, legislators, other state boards of nursing, nursing education programs, providers of mandatory continuing education, state government agencies and other interested individuals and groups are also included in the newsletter circulation.

Board of Nursing representation was provided to the Subcommittee on Nursing Education of the Council on Higher Education, the Kentucky Council Cabinet for Degree Nursing, the Human Resources-Kentucky Nurses Association Committee on Nursing, the Kentucky Nurses Association Board of Directors, the KNA Commission on Education, the KNA Commission on Continuing Education, and the Kentucky State Association of Licensed Practical Nurses. Board and staff members served as members of the Board of Directors of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN), the NCSBN Diagnostic Assessment Test Committee and to the W.K. Kellogg-Pennsylvania State University Continuing Professional Education Project. Active involvement of the Board was also provided by representation to the Kentucky Nurses Association Task Force on Statewide Planning for Continuing Education and to the Council on Higher Education Nursing Task Delineation Project.

The Board maintained cooperation with local, state and national organizations and agencies involved with health data collection for manpower planning needs. For example, the Board provided data for a national survey on licensed practical nurses and, both provided data and agreed to collect additional data via the licensure renewal application process for manpower studies conducted by the Cabinet for Human Resources.

At the request of the Kentucky Board of Nursing, the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) Delegate Assembly directed that a national conference be held for those jurisdictions which require mandatory continuing education for relicensure of nurses. The purpose of the conference was to facilitate interstate transfer of continuing education earnings by nurses. Kentucky hosted the conference and a resolution was submitted for action by the 1983 NCSBN Delegate Assembly. The resolution provides for the acceptance of continuing education earning approved by other mandatory jurisdictions when a nurse holds current licensure in two or more mandatory jurisdictions.

As the Board and staff members' time permitted, consultation services were provided to nursing education programs, to employers of nurses, providers of continuing education, and to other individuals and groups upon request. Approximately 145 meetings/conferences were held with various individuals and groups.

The misuse or abuse of controlled substances by licensees has become an increasingly complex problem encountered by the Board of Nursing. Consistent with a national trend, the Board has received increasing numbers of complaints regarding drug abuse/misuse by Kentucky nurses, a circumstance which has contributed significantly to the continuing rise in disciplinary activities undertaken in the interest of public protection. The issue of how to deal effectively with the impaired professional beyond the point of disciplinary action such as licensure revocation, has increased in consonance with the problem of abuse itself.

To validate that an individual whose license has been revoked for cause is once again able to function in a competent, safe and effective manner, a licensure reinstatement hearing is required. The burden of proof of such rehabilitation rests with the disciplined licensee. However, the judgment remains with the Board. To insure that a disciplined licensee is at some time later capable of practicing nursing within the scope defined by statute, evidence of counseling is of significant benefit to Board members hearing such reinstatement cases.

Until recently expert counseling for impaired nurses has not, in most cases, been readily accessible. During the past year however, the College of Nursing of the University of Kentucky undertook the development of a counseling service for nurses who are impaired by stress and/or the abuse of drugs. The project, known as Nurses Assisting Nurses (NAN), will begin operation in January, 1984.

In the interest of public protection, assuring appropriate treatment for disciplined licensees is imperative. Because of the disciplinary role of the Board in its relationship with impaired nurses, the Board and representatives of NAN adopted guidelines to clarify the relationships between the Kentucky Board of Nursing and Nurses Assisting Nurses. It is the belief of the Board that this cooperative relationship will be of unquestioning value both to the individual nurse and to the public at large.

As mandated by statute, the Board of Nursing meets at least annually with the Advisory Council appointed by the Governor. In order to enhance the input of the Advisory Council membership into the Board decision making process the Board adopted a Policy Statement for the Advisory Council. The statement delineates the functions of the Council, its membership, order of agenda for meetings and procedures for submitting agenda items for consideration. It is the intent of the Board to gain as much participation as possible through its Advisory Council.

Nursing Education

Kentucky has been challenged to provide an adequate number of qualified nurses in order to meet the continuing demand for nurse manpower in the Commonwealth. The proposed to this demand as demonstrated by the dynamic state of nursing education in many educational institutions within the past fiscal year. The proposed Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) program of Bellarmine College, Louisville was granted initial approval and dmitted students to the program in January 1983. The University of Kentucky, lexington and the University of Louisville, Louisville submitted proposals for initiating Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) programs and were granted approval to continue development. The admission of students to these new BSN programs was scheduled for fall 1982 and fall 1983 respectively. (The University of Kentucky BSN program was a reconstitution of a previously conducted program.) a letter of intent to establish a new Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) program was received from Pikeville College, Pikeville. The Pikeville program is scheduled to admit students in January 1984.

Though new programs continued to be established, several programs closed or were in the process of phasing out. Cumberland College, Williamstown (ADN program), closed in June 1983; the Baptist Hospital School of Nursing, Louisville is scheduled to graduate its last class in December 1983; and the University of Louisville, Louisville (ADN program) will graduate its last class during the 1983-84 year. As of June 30, 1983, the total number of approved prelicensure nursing education programs in operation was forty-three; of those, sixteen were practical nurse programs and twenty-seven were registered nurse programs (6 BSN, 20 ADN and 1 diploma).

Monitoring of the nursing education programs' compliance with Board regulations and policies was accomplished through the review of Annual Reports, annual faculty summaries, and lists of clinical facilities submitted by all nursing education programs preparing individuals for licensure as registered and licensed practical nurses. Ten schools visit reports were acted on by the Board and twenty-six reports submitted by various nursing education programs to show evidence of compliance with requirements were considered by the Board. Nursing education programs found not to be in compliance with the regulations and policies of the Board were required to study and analyze the areas of non-compliance and submit plans for corrective action.

consultation to the nursing education programs was provided by the nursing education consultant of the Board's staff and an annual conference was held for all nurse administrators of the nursing education programs. The plan for revision of all administrative regulations related to the approval of nursing education programs which had been accepted in the 1981-82 year, was implemented, and the Board of Nursing approved a draft of the revised regulations. These drafts constituted a total revision of the ten Kentucky Administrative gegulations currently in effect for nursing education programs. It is anticipated that the revised regulations will be submitted to the Legislative gesearch Commission for approval during the 1983-84 year.

Approved Nursing Education Programs

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the legally authorized body in Kentucky to approve schools or programs of nursing preparing persons for eligibility for licensure as nurses. Under the provisions of KRS 314.011, 314.031, 314.111 and 314.131, the Board prescribes standards for schools of nursing and courses preparing persons for licensure as nurses. It provides for surveys of schools and for approval of schools and courses which meet the requirements of the law, regulations and policies.

As of June 30, 1983, there were seven (7) generic baccalaureate, twenty-one (21) associate degree, one (1) diploma and sixteen (16) practical nursing programs. In contrast, seventeen years ago, there were four (4) generic baccalaureate, nine (9) associate degree, eleven (11) diploma and fifteen (15) practical nursing programs.

Mandatory Continuing Education

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the Commonwealth agency legally authorized to approve providers of mandatory continuing education for nurses. In accordance with the Kentucky Nursing Practice Act (Kentucky Revised Statutes, Chapter 314.073), the Board prescribes standards for both the providers of continuing education and for continuing education offerings/programs.

During the calendar year 1981, the approval program for providers of continuing education was initiated in order that continuing education offerings approved by the Board would be both available and accessible for nurses who were required to meet contact hour earnings for renewal of licenses for the first time in 1982. The number of approved providers has increased rapidly since 1981. In addition to those providers who were granted continued approval during the 1982-83 year, fourteen new providers were approved. At the close of the year on June 30, a total of 140 providers of continuing education held approval by the Board.

Nurses reported attendance at approximately 2,500 offerings and approximately 425,000 contact hours were reported as having been earned by nurses to meet the licensure renewal requirement. This contact hour reporting included acceptance of out-of-state offerings accredited by appropriate bodies as well as academic credit earnings.

The continuing evaluation of the total program of mandatory continuing education and the revisions to Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314, which became effective July 15, 1982, resulted in simplification of both the processes for approval and evaluation of providers of continuing education and for the approval of programs and offerings. Four Kentucky Adminstrative Regulations relating to continuing education requirements were revised by the Board and approved by the Legislative Research Commission. The revisions to the regulations included the new provisions of KRS Chapter 314 and requirements to facilitate reinstatement of nurses to inactive licensure status, and changes were made for consistency in requirements for the licensure endorsement and reinstatement processes.

The annual evaluations submitted by approved providers indicated a high degree of compliance with the Board's Standards and Criteria for Mandatory Continuing Education for Nurses. Based on the results of the evaluations, the Board adopted two and four-year approval criteria for providers of programs of mandatory continuing education.

In 1984, nurses will be given the opportunity to earn continuing education requirements via self-study. To that end, the Board adopted Preliminary Guidelines for Implementation of Self-Study Continuing Education Earning.

Other major activities of the Board relative to the mandatory continuing education program included direction of staff to make the necessary preparation for entering into personal services contract with organizations for the purpose of reviewing continuing education programs and offerings. The contract services will finalize the relationship between the Board and those organizations which review continuing education programming and recommend approval to the Board. Another direction of the Board was the revision of the administrative regulation on definitions for continuing education to include basic cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) as a part of the definition of inservice education. As a result of this action, basic CPR content will no longer be acceptable for

continuing education requirements effective in 1984 for registered nurses and in 1985 for licensed practical nurses.

The automated record keeping system, installed in the Board office in early 1982, has affected the total operation of the Board. The processing and recording of continuing education data would not have been possible without the system. A particular benefit to individual licensees is the notification sent to them at the time of licensure renewal which states whether the continuing education requirement has been met, not met, or that the nurse is exempt from the requirements according to the revisions of the 1982 law. As the Board is mandated by law to maintain records of continuing education, another benefit to the individual licensee is the ability to request a report of contact hours recorded on the nurse's individual record on file in the Board office.

There are one-hundred thirty-one (131) providers of mandatory continuing education located within the Commonwealth and nine (9) located out-of-state for a total of one-hundred forty (140) approved providers of mandatory continuing education for Kentucky nursing licensees. These providers are classified according to type of agency; and as of June 30, 1983, the categorical breakdown of providers is as follows: Professional Nursing Organizations (11); Related Nursing Organizations (2); Educational Institutions (26); Health Service Agencies (77); Health Related Organizations (15); and Other (9).

Approval was granted to fourteen (14) providers of mandatory continuing education during the period of July 1, 1982 to June 30, 1983. During that period, five (5) providers ceased participation in the Board approved providership program and are designated as withdrawn or "WD."

NURSING PRACTICE

Due to a constantly increasing number of requests from nurses, employers of nurses, and other groups and individuals, the Board found it necessary to have matters on practice issues studied by a separate committee. Therefore, in June of 1982 the Board of Nursing established a fourth standing committee entitled the Practice Committee. To provide additional assistance in this area, a qualified nursing education consultant was employed to work primarily in the areas of nursing practice, and investigation and disciplinary activity. In just one year's time, the Practice Committee and the Board processed 47 inquiries on matters related to nursing practice issues. Over 180 letters were received relative to one issue alone, that of the role of nurses in intravenous therapy practice. Because many of the concerns received were similar, the Board, through the recommendation of the Practice Committee, adopted opinions on the following nursing practice matters:

THE ROLE OF THE RN/LPN IN SPINAL SCREENING FOR DETECTION OF COMMON ABNORMALITIES

THE ROLE OF THE ARMP/RN/LPN IN GYNECOLOGICAL CANCER DETECTION

THE ROLE OF THE RN IN INSERTION OF NASOGASTRIC TUBES

ROLES OF NURSES IN INTRAVENOUS THERAPY PRACTICE

Another practice issue raised by a number of nurses and employers of nurses was that of the role of nurses in situations where patients are receiving epidural drips either for anesthesia or for control of pain. These matters were studied and opinions were issued on individual bases to persons making inquiries. Recently, the Practice Committee was directed by the Board to study the role of nurses in the performance of advanced cardiac life support procedures and the role of nurses as surgical assistants. At the close of the year, the Committee was in the process of studying these matters.

INVESTIGATION AND DISCIPLINARY ACTION

During each of the past five years the Board has received increasing numbers of complaints on nursing practice. For example, the total number of complaints received per annum has doubled in less than a three year period. Two years ago the Board implemented a policy on administrative hearings which provided for three Board members serving as a panel to hear disciplinary cases. In addition, more applicants for licensure are indicating previous criminal convictions. Such applications must be reviewed by at least one member of the Board before being processed. Although the number of hearings and disciplinary actions have increased during the past several years, the case load has also continued to increase due to the volume of complaints received. In an effort to expedite processing of complaints, the Board approved Agreed Orders and Board member may hear cases for reinstatement of directed that one revoked or probated licenses except those cases resultant from Agreed Orders. These cases must be heard by a three member hearing panel.

To enhance Board member orientation to hearing processes, the Board adopted a statement on the Board Hearing Officer which delineated the duties of a hearing

officer. The Board also adopted Guidelines for Order of Proceedings for Hearings to assist all parties involved in the hearing process.

The increasing number of licensees on probation who are mandated to report to the Board on a quarterly or semi-annual basis has required additional staff time.

It is projected that during 1983-84 approximately 25 hearings will be scheduled for those persons either completing probation or requesting reinstatement of suspended or revoked licenses. Additionally, hearings will need to be scheduled for both the current caseload of 44 active cases and, for the increased number of complaints projected for the coming year. Mechanisms to expedite the handling of this volume of cases were being studied at the end of the fiscal year.

The Board accepted a revision of the Policy and Procedure for Determining the Need for Disciplinary Action on KRS Chapter 314 Violation and Conviction Records used for reviewing applications of those licensure appliants who have had a previous criminal conviction record. These revisions are expected to expedite the review of suspected violations and/or conviction records, and will give direction to staff for handling these situations in a timely manner.

During the year, disciplinary orders of the Board were appealed by three disciplined licensees. The Board was notified that in one case, the circuit court had upheld its order. Action on the other two appeals is pending.

In June of 1983, a conference was held for nursing service administrators of all health care facilities in the Commonwealth and approximately 700 agencies were invited to send representatives. Designed primarily to assist nursing service administrators to understand the changes in the nursing practice act as revised by the 1982 Kentucky General Assembly, the conference content focused on the following:

- 1) The detection and documentation of suspected violations of the law:
- 2) Reporting of complaints on nurses suspected of violating the law:

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3) Participation in the investigative and hearing processes associated with disciplinary action.

Of particular note is that one of the 1982 revisions of the Nursing Practice Act mandated that persons having knowledge of facts must report any suspected violation of the Nursing Practice Act to the Board of Nursing, under penalty of law. It is believed that this reporting requirement will increase the number of complaints submitted to the Board.

Another 1982 revision to the law authorized the Board to issue limited licenses to handicapped but otherwise qualified applicants for licensure, and to persons disciplined by the Board. Prior to the implementation of the "limited license" concept, regulations must be adopted by the Board. Work continues on the study for implementation of this concept, and it is planned that regulations will be adopted and submitted for approval during the 1983-84 year.

The Kentucky Nursing Practice Act provides that the Board of Nursing may "deny, limit, revoke, probate or suspend any license to practice nursing issued by the Board or applied for ... or to otherwise discipline a licensee or to deny admission to the licensure examination" if an individual is in violation of the nursing law.

The Board has continued its efforts to make the public aware of the investigatory and disciplinary procedures and to emphasize the legal requirement and importance of reporting nurses who are engaging in unsafe or illegal practices.

Forty-two (42) decisions were entered and ten (10) agreed orders were accepted by the Board for licensees and/or applicants and resulted in the following actions:

PART IV

LICENSURE AND REGISTRATION ACTIVITIES

Nurse Credentials and Licensure Requirements

The primary mission of the Board of Nursing is public protection. This mission continued to be accomplished through the licensure and registration of only those applicants who met statutory and regulatory requirements. Three administrative regulations relevant to renewal of licenses, licensure periods, and fees for applications and services were approved by the Legislative Research Commission and implemented by the Board.

Statistical data on licenses and registrations issued illustrated that the numbers of licensed practical nurses, registered nurses and advanced registered nurse practitioners had all increased continuing a ten year trend. As was the case during the previous year, the number of reinstated registered nurse and licensed practical nurse licenses increased moderately, due primarily to licensee non-compliance with the relicensure continuing education requirement. Also, more licensees chose to maintain current licensure on an inactive status rather than on an active status, the latter of which requires continuing education earnings.

Of significant benefit to nurse licensees was the 1982 revision of the Nursing Practice Act which exempted those individuals newly licensed (either by endorsement or examination) from meeting the continuing education requirements for the first renewal following initial issuance of a Kentucky license. Because of the variance in dates licenses are issued to applicants by examination and endorsement, without this exemption it would have been impossible for some of these newly licensed nurses to meet requirements for mandatory continuing education.

The licenses of employed nurses were monitored by checking over 1400 lists of employed licensees submitted by employers of both registered and licensed practical nurses. This mechanism assists employers in the determination of qualifications of nurses both prior to employment and on an ongoing basis.

The participation of the Board in the National Disciplinary Data Bank of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing facilitated the detection of impostors and/or persons who have had action taken on licenses by other jurisdictions. Reports were received in the Board office on a monthly basis, and were routinely reviewed as a part of the procedure for licensure application review.

Licensure Examinations

Since the initiation of national licensure examinations for nurses in the late 1940s, the Kentucky Board of Nursing has adopted officially as its licensure examination, those examinations provided by the National League for Nursing Test Service and most recently by the CTB/McGraw-Hill Test Service, under the auspices of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing. Prior to the July 1982 examination, the title of examination was the State Board Test Pool Examination (SBTPE). The new the National Council Licensure Examination examination entitled is (NCLEX), with the designation of either RN for registered nurses or PN for practical nurses. In addition to the title change, another significant change began in July 1982, in that the licensure examinations are now scored by using a criterion referenced-scoring system instead of a norm-reference scoring system. The scoring method was changed on the basis of advice provided by psychometricians familiar with licensure examination development.

Another major change in the licensure examination occurred for registered nurses, in that the examinations administered prior to July 1982 consisted of five separate tests and five score reports. The new comprehensive examination for registered nurse licensure based on a revised test plan, consists of an examination with four parts and one score reported. Previously, any registered nurse candidate who failed any one test of the total examination, was not allowed to practice nursing until such time as all five tests were passed.

As was expected, with the initiation of the one score report for the total examination, the percentage pass-rate by the graduates on the licensure examination changed. The pass-rate of graduates from Kentucky programs increased and was found to be comparable to the national percentage pass-rate of all graduates who took the licensure examination for the first time.

These changes in scoring and format have facilitated the development and implementation of two mechanisms to assist candidates to prepare for the licensure examination. A Diagnostic Assessment Program was made available for all candidates who wished to prepare for the examination by testing themselves via the use of a clinical simulated examination. For those candidates who were unsuccessful in passing the licensure examination, a Diagnostic Profile Report was prepared, which illustrated areas of weakness according to the content requirements of the examination. It is hoped that both the Diagnostic Assessment Program and the Diagnostic Profile will assist candidates in preparing for the examination and to achieve a passing score.

The Board of Nursing continued the process of reviewing all drafts of test items prepared by the test service for both registered and practical nurse licensure examinations, in order to assist with the construction of valid examinations. Further, two Kentucky nurses were selected by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing to be item writers for the registered nurse and practical nurse licensure examinations.

Finally, it should be noted that the past two years have shown an increase in candidates for licensure by examination as licensed practical nurses, while the number of candidates for licensure by examination as registered nurses has declined during the same period.

REGISTERED NURSE LICENSURE BY EXAMINATION

The Kentucky Nursing Practice Act states "An applicant shall be required to pass a written examination in such subjects as the board may prescribe." This applies to applicants for registered nurse licensure and applicants for practical nurse licensure. The Kentucky Board of Nursing participates in the National Council Licensure Examination for both types of licensure examination. Statistics on the number of candidates writing for the first time and percent passing rate follow.

LICENSURE BY ENDORSEMENT

KRS 314.041(4) states "The board may issue a license to practice nursing as a registered nurse to an applicant who has passed the state board test pool exam or an equivalent examination approved by the board and been licensed as a registered nurse under the laws of another state, territory or foreign country if in the opinion of the board the applicant is qualified to practice professional nursing in this state."

KRS 314.051(5) states "The board may issue a license to practice as a licensed practical nurse to any applicant who has passed the state board test pool exam or an equivalent examination approved by the board and has been licensed or registered as a licensed practical nurse or a person licensed to perform similar services under a different title, under the laws of another state, territory or foreign country if, in the opinion of the board, the applicant meets the requirements for a licensed practical nurse in this state."

KRS 314.101(3) states "A temporary work permit may be issued by the board to persons who have completed the requirements for, applied for and paid the fee for licensure by examination or endorsement. Temporary work permits shall be issued only for the length of time required to process applications for endorsement or to conduct and determine the results of examinations and shall not be renewed. No temporary work permit shall be issued to an applicant who has failed the licensure examination."

ADVANCED REGISTERED NURSE PRACTITIONERS

In 1978, the Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314 was revised to include the registration and designation of registered nurses as advanced registered nurse practitioners (ARNPs). The practitioner group included designations as nurse anesthetist, nurse midwife, nurse practitioner, and clinical nurse specialist. Since that time, over 700 registered nurses have been registered with the Board as advanced registered nurse practitioners. The revisions to the law in 1982 mandated that all registered nurses who practice as ARNPs must be registered with the Board. These revisions also set forth provisions for renewal and reinstatement of such registrations.

As recommended by the Nurse Practice Council, the Board adopted guidelines for the implementation of ARNP registration and specialty designation. One set of guidelines related to the acceptance of certification granted by national nursing organizations as meeting requirements for ARNP registration. The other set of guidelines related to organized post-basic programs meeting the specialty designation content of the registration requirement. In addition, the Board requested that the Nurse Practice Council study and make recommendations regarding medication prescription authority for advanced registered nurse practitioners. At the close of the year, the Council was in the process of studying this issue.

Kentucky Administrative Regulation 201 KAR 20:056 registration of advanced registered nurse practitioners, was revised by the Nurse Practice Council and the recommended revision was approved by the Board. The proposed revision was submitted to the Legislative Research Commission which approved the regulation for implementation.

ADVANCED REGISTERED NURSE PRACTITIONER REGISTRATIONS

KRS 314.011(6) and (7) define advanced registered nurse practitioner and advanced registered nursing practice. KRS 314.131 empowers the Board to "register and designate those persons qualified to engage in advanced nursing practice." Beginning in October 1978, the Kentucky Board of Nursing officially recognized the advanced registered nurse practitioner.

KENTUCKY NURSING LICENSES*

ISSUED JULY 1, 1982 - JUNE 30, 1983

The Kentucky Nursing Practice Act provides "The license of every person under the provisions of KRS 314 ... shall be annually renewed ..." By administrative regulation 201 KAR 20:080, the Kentucky Board of Nursing has determined that the licensure period for the registered nurse shall be May 1 - April 30 and November 1 - October 31 for the licensed practical nurse. KRS 314.031 states "It shall be unlawful for any person to call or hold himself out as or use the title of nurse or to practice or offer to practice as a nurse unless licensed under the provision of KRS 314 ..."

GOAL I

ENSURE THAT PERSONS LICENSED AS NURSES AND REGISTERED AS ADVANCED REGISTERED NURSE PRACTITIONERS IN KENTUCKY ARE QUALIFIED ACCORDING TO REQUIREMENTS TO PROVIDE THE CITIZENS OF THE COMMONWEALTH WITH SAFE AND EFFECTIVE NURSING CARE.

'OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Approve schools of nursing and clinical facilities to promote competency of new graduates.
- 2. Study impact of schools of nursing and extension programs to monitor supply of nurses.
- 3. License and register qualified applicants in order to protect the public.
- 4. Investigate and resolve complaints to protect public from incompetent nurses or applicants.
- 5. Monitor licensure status of employed nurses for public protection.
- 6. Deny, probate, suspend, limit or revoke licenses of incompetent applicants or nurses who have negligently or willfully acted in a manner inconsistent with the practice of nursing, to protect the public.
- 7. Expand investigative and enforcement processes to regulate nurses and nursing practice.

1983 - 1984

- 1. Continue meeting objectives for 1982 1983 as appropriate.
- 2. Implement limited licensure status to protect the public.
- 3. Improve processes for reporting of suspected violations to protect the public.
- 4. Study programs for impaired nurses to determine potential use in the disposition of complaints.

GOAL II

MAINTAIN A QUALITY PROGRAM OF MANDATORY CONTINUING EDUCATION FOR RELICENSURE OF NURSES.

OBJECTIVES: 1982 - 1983

- 1. Approve providers of continuing education for nurses.

- 3. Continue orientation of Board and staff members to policies and procedures.
- 4. Promote Board decision making processes within a coordinated committee structure.
- 5. Implement unified and integrated system of accounts (UISA) for accuracy of records.
- 6. Implement uniform personnel payroll system (UPPS) for accuracy of records.
- 7. Monitor and maintain control of expenditures within budgetary allocations.
- 8. Expand utilization of electronic data processing system to achieve optimum capabilities.
- 9. Implement direct application procedure for applicants for licensure by examination.

ASSERT LEADERSHIP IN STATE GOVERNMENT, NURSING EDUCATION, NURSING PRACTICE AND THE PUBLIC ARENA TO PROMOTE THE DELIVERY OF SAFE AND EFFECTIVE NURSING SERVICES.

OBJECTIVES: 1982- 1983

- 1. Inform nurses, state agencies, organizations, employers 1982 nurses and the public at large of the regulations and policies adopted for public protection and welfare.
- 2. Continue active participation as a Member Board of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing to promote use of standards on a national scope.
