PREFACE

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the state government agency authorized by Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314, to approve, regulate, and control nursing education and practice, to examine and license qualified graduates of approved prelicensure programs of nursing, to approve providers of continuing education, to license qualified nurse applicants, and to register and designate qualified advanced registered nurse practitioner applicants.

To provide guidance in fulfilling the statutory mission of the Board of Nursing, four major goals with attendant objectives were delineated at the onset of 1984-86 Biennium. These goals and objectives are found on pages 60 and 61 of this Report. The 1984-85 ANNUAL REPORT of the Board of Nursing summarizes the activities carried out by the Board to accomplish its mission, goals, and objectives. The major programs and activities of the Board of Nursing are described and include: nursing education, mandatory continuing education, nursing practice, credentials and licensure, disciplinary investigation and action, administrative regulations of the Board, office operation, and state and national involvement. Information is also provided on the Board structures and finances.

Information contained throughout this 1984-85 ANNUAL REPORT of the Board of Nursing shows the depth and scope of the activities of the Board members and staff and highlights the multi-faceted activities and involvements of the Board of Nursing. The Report information documents that the Board of Nursing is accomplishing its statutory mission to protect the public by licensing and registering only those individuals who are competent and effective as nurse licensees. The goals and objectives, adopted for the 1984-86 Biennium, have provided direction for the ongoing development and implementation of sound regulatory practice in the interest of public protection for the citizens of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Projections for the 1985-86 year of the Biennium offer a challenge to the Board and staff members to continue fulfilling the statutory mission of the Board of Nursing.

COMPOSITION OF BOARD, COMMITTEES, COUNCILS AND STAFF

Board of Nursing - Structures and Operation

To accommodate the changing needs of the agency in fulfilling its increasingly complex responsibilities, the organizational charts for the Board of Nursing programs and for the staff were revised to clearly delineate the Board program functions, structures and staff responsibilities. Included in the organizational chart revisions were the establishment of attorney and nursing investigator positions and changes in support staff positions. This revision strengthened the staff organizational design of two major branches with five program units each.

Recognizing the value of the work of the Ad Hoc Committee-Long Range Planning in reviewing the total Board operation and in planning for the future, the Board converted the committee to a Board standing committee entitled, Study and Planning Committee. The purpose, functions and composition of the committee remained the same. The standing and ad hoc committees of the Board, serving in an advisory capacity, continued to expedite the Board decision making process. The composition of the committees included volunteer members who provided appropriate input from interested parties affected by the regulatory practices of the Board. As required, all meetings of the Board and its committees and councils were held in open session with the few exceptions as noted in the open meetings law. The meetings were advertised in the Board communications with licensees and the public as required. In total, the Board held five regular meetings, including the annual meeting, and four special meetings.

Cognizant of the continuing need for communication with all parties affected or interested in the activities of the Board, the semi-annual newsletter of the Board was expanded by two pages, and the Board directed that a brief description of cause for disciplinary action be included in the report of action on licenses. Parenthetically, the Board was commended by two Kentucky legislators for the concise style and clarity of content of the newsletter.

Following the enactment of KRS Chapter 13A by the 1984 Kentucky General Assembly, the Board undertook the task of reviewing, revising, and writing administrative regulations for compliance with the provisions of KRS Chapter 13A. The process involved writing fourteen new administrative regulations, revising thirteen administrative regulations, recommending repeal of eleven administrative regulations, and petitioning continuance for two administrative regulations after review for compliance with KRS Chapter 13A. Commendation is due to the committees of the Board for their tireless efforts to accomplish this herculean task in so short a time. Likewise, the recommendations of such groups as the Advisory Council, Nurse Practice Council, approved providers of continuing education, and nurse administrators of approved prelicensure programs of nursing, were invaluable.

As mandated by statute, the Board of Nursing meets at least annually with the Advisory Council appointed by the Governor. The Board met with the Advisory Council and reviewed the activities of the Board and gained input through valuable discussion with that Council. In addition, meetings were held by the statutory Nurse Practice Council which contributed significantly to the regulation of advanced registered nurse practitioners and the revision of administrative regulations for advanced registered nurse practitioners in Kentucky.

The trend of increased number of complaints received on nurses continued by about twenty percent in comparison to the previous fiscal year. Of note was the resolution of one hundred and forty-three complaints, the highest level of this activity in the history of the Board. In preparation for handling the increased volume of investigations and disciplinary actions, the Board directed that effective July 1, 1985, panels for hearing cases be composed of two Board members and that the presiding officer of the hearing be an assistant attorney general. The use of agreed orders in the disposition of complaints increased. In addition, the use of consent decrees was adopted to handle complaints on individuals who had practiced nursing in the Commonwealth for a period of less than six months without a temporary work permit, license or registration issued by the Board. The revised hearing panel structure and use of agreed orders and consent decrees augmented the resolution of complaints in a more efficient manner for all parties involved.

The finances of the Board continued to be monitored carefully in view of the increased scope and volume of functions, new costs for services as part of state government, and ongoing costs. The Biennial Budget for 1984-86 as approved by the General Assembly was revised due to a two percent appropriation to the General Fund. At the end of the fiscal year, the transfer of monies had not been made to the General Fund because of litigation by the attorney general and others who maintained the transfer was unconstitutional. As part of budget planning, revenues and expenditures were projected for a five year period and the past ten year finances for the Board were reviewed. Further, the Board directed that an investigation of investment of the Board fund balance be done which resulted in the conclusion that statutory authority for such investment of funds was required. The Board directed that this authority be included in the Nursing Practice Act revisions for presentation to the 1986 General Assembly.

The staff of the Board agency participated actively in the Evaluation Subcommittee of the Department of Personnel. This subcommittee was charged with the development of an evaluation plan for state employees. Staff both attended hearings held by the subcommittee and submitted written suggestions to the committee.

The Board agency became a participating member of the Government Services Center housed at Kentucky State University in Frankfort. This Center provides training and continuing education programs for state employees. By the close of the year, a significant number of Board staff had taken advantage of this opportunity to maintain and upgrade skills and knowledge needed for their position responsibilities.

This report of the Board would be remiss were it not to recognize the long term contributions of a staff person who had served the Board agency for approximately twenty-six years. On the occasion of her retirement from the Board staff, Marzetta Hagan, Business Manager, was commissioned as a Kentucky Colonel by the Governor. The staff and members of the Board of Nursing extend best wishes to Mrs. Hagan!

The Board met nine times during the year 1984-85 for a total of fourteen days.

The Board members also participated in other activities including examinations and committee meetings. Twenty-eight hearings were conducted by hearing panels which consisted of three Board members. The members served equal time on the hearing panels. The estimated average time for members to attend meetings, administer examinations and represent the Board was 30.2 days per year.



ORGANIZATION CHART OF PROGRAMS


REGULATION OF NURSES AND NURSING EDUCATION AND PRACTICE

BOARD OF NURSING INVOLVEMENTS AND LEADERSHIP ACTIVITIES

Included among the diverse activities of the Board during the 1984-85 year, was representation to the following groups: Governor's Task Force on Prescription Drug Abuse, Kentucky Council of Associate Degree Nursing, Kentucky State Medical Board of Licensure Ad Hoc Committee on Physician Assistant Practice, Kentucky Nurses Association Board of Directors, KNA Cabinet on Education, KNA Cabinet on Continuing Education, KNA Basic Entry Level (BEL) Committee, Kentucky State Association of Licensed Practical Nurses, Kentucky Nursing Continuing Education Network, Regulatory Agencies and Controlled Substance Abuse Group, and Advisory Board of Nurses Assisting Nurses (NAN). Individuals from the Board and staff membership served on the Board of Directors of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN), NCSBN Diagnostic Assessment Test Committee, and the W. K. Kellogg - Pennsylvania State University Continuing Professional Education Project.

The Board continued cooperation with local, state and national organizations and agencies involved with health data collection for nursing manpower needs. For example, the Board provided data for a national survey on nurses, and both provided data and agreed to collect additional data via the licensure renewal application process for manpower studies conducted by the Cabinet for Human Resources. Also, data were released to the National Council of State Boards of Nursing relative to nurse licensure and disciplinary actions taken by the Board.

The Board maintained its active membership as a member board of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing. Representation was provided at the Delegate Assembly and Area III annual meetings of the National Council. Further, two former members of the Board were nominated for appointment to the Panel of Judges for the Modified Angoff Passing Score for NCLEX-PN, and four individuals were nominated for appointment to the Panel of Content Experts for NCLEX-PN in lieu of reviewing draft test items. Significant time was given by members of the Board in the completion of a Trend Analysis Survey as requested by the Long Range Planning Committee of the National Council and in the completion of a Membership Needs Analysis conducted by Touche-Ross Company on behalf of the National Council.

To foster both effective and efficient communications with individuals and groups affected by regulatory practices, the Board directed that a two day annual conference be sponsored by the Board instead of three separate annual conferences for nursing service administrators, providers of continuing education and administrators of prelicensure programs of nursing. In addition, as noted earlier, the KBN COMMUNIQUE' newsletter was expanded. During the year, the newsletter was sent on a semi-annual schedule to all nurses who held current licensure on either active or inactive status, to prelicensure programs of nursing education, providers of continuing education, employers of nurses, Kentucky legislators, Kentucky regulatory and state government agencies, other state boards of nursing, and interested parties.

Consultation services were provided by the Board and staff members to nursing education programs, to employers of nurses, providers of continuing education, and to other individuals and groups upon request as feasible. Over one hundred meetings/conferences were held with various individuals and groups.

Beyond the many internal meetings held by the Board, staff and members of the Board attended state and national meetings including CLEAR conferences sponsored by the Council of State Governments, National Conferences on the Impaired Nurse,

and Conferences on Prescription Drug Abuse. Also, members participated in a number of state-wide meetings such as those sponsored by the Kentucky Hospital Association on Employee Assistance Programs and other related topics.

Of particular note was involvement of the Board of Nursing in research activities. Assistance was provided to a research project by the Director of Nurses Assisting Nurses (NAN) entitled, "Survey of Registered Nurses' Attitudes and Perceptions of Nursing Impairment." Research by a member of the Board on the evaluation and impact of mandatory continuing education on nurses entitled, "The Impact of Mandatory Continuing Education in Nursing As Perceived by Kentucky Licensees, 1985-86," was supported.

Intensified activity for increasing educational requirements for licensure occurred by various professional groups of nurses in the state and in the nation. The Board of Nursing adopted a position statement on Entry Into Practice proposals, and though taking no position on the issue itself at this time, the Board adopted the position that the licenses of current licensees be protected whenever a proposal for increasing educational requirements may be introduced and adopted.

At the close of the fiscal year, the Board, in preparation for the 1986 General Assembly, accepted a first draft of needed revisions to KRS Chapter 314 to provide for the public safety and welfare. To proceed with the work of revising the Nursing Practice Act, the Board appointed an Ad Hoc Law Revisions Committee consisting of three members of the Board of Nursing, and three members each from the Kentucky State Association of Licensed Practical Nurses, Kentucky Nurses Association, and Kentucky Society of Hospital Nursing Service Administrators. The first meeting of the committee was scheduled for July 1985.

NURSING EDUCATION

Nursing education in Kentucky continued to be dynamic in many educational institutions during the past fiscal year. The proposed generic Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing (BSN) program of Bellarmine College, Louisville was granted initial approval and admitted students in July, 1985. The practical nursing program at the Rowan State Vocational-Technical School, Morehead was also granted initial approval and admitted students in January, 1985. Action on the proposal to initiate a Bachelor of Science in Nursing program submitted by Morehead State University, Morehead was deferred pending action by the Council on Higher Education.

Although a potential new program was proposed, two programs closed and one was in the process of phasing out. The Associate Degree Nursing Program, University of Louisville, Louisville closed in May, 1984; the Central Kentucky State Vocational-Technical School of Practical Nursing, Lexington, Morehead extension program, closed December, 1984; and the Associate Degree Nursing Program, Bellarmine College, Louisville was scheduled to graduate its last class during the 1985-86 year. As of June 30, 1985, the total number of approved prelicensure nursing education programs in operations was forty-five (45). Of those, seventeen (17) were practical nursing programs and twenty-eight (28) were registered nurse programs (8 BSN and 20 ADN).

Monitoring of the nursing education programs' compliance with Board regulations and policies was accomplished through the review of Annual Reports, Annual Faculty Summaries, and Lists of Clinical Facilities submitted by all nursing education programs preparing individuals for licensure as registered and licensed practical nurses. Nine school visit reports were acted on by the Board and twenty reports submitted by various nursing education programs to show evidence of compliance with requirements were considered by the Board. Nursing education programs found not to be in compliance with the regulations and policies of the Board were required to study and analyze the areas of non-compliance and submit plans for corrective action.

Consultation to the nursing education programs was provided by the nursing education consultant of the Board's staff. The plan for the revision of all administrative regulations related to the approval of nursing education programs was implemented. The revised Kentucky Administrative Regulations for programs of nursing were submitted to, and approved by the Legislative Research Commission during the 1984-85 fiscal year. A total of twelve (12) Kentucky Administrative Regulations became effective for nursing education programs.

Approved Nursing Education Programs

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the legally authorized body in Kentucky to approve schools of nursing preparing persons for eligibility for licensure as nurses. Under the provisions of KRS 314.011, 314.031, 314.111 and 314.131, the Board prescribes standards for schools of nursing and courses preparing persons for licensure as nurses. It provides for surveys of schools and for approval of schools and courses which meet the requirements of the law, regulations and policies.

As of June 30, 1985, there were eight (8) generic baccalaureate, twenty (20) associate degree and seventeen (17) practical nursing programs. In contrast, nineteen years ago, there were four (4) generic baccalaureate, nine (9) associate degree, eleven (11) diploma and fifteen (15) practical nursing programs.

MANDATORY CONTINUING EDUCATION

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the Commonwealth agency legally authorized to approve providers of mandatory continuing education for nurses. In accordance with the Kentucky Nursing Practice Act (Kentucky Revised Statutes, Chapter 314.073), the Board prescribes standards for both the providers of continuing education and for continuing education offerings/programs.

During the calendar year 1981, the approval program for providers of continuing education was initiated in order that continuing education offerings approved by the Board would be both available and accessible for nurses who were required to meet contact hour earnings for renewal of licenses for the first time in 1982. Since that time, the number of approved providers has stabilized, with approximately 10 entities seeking approval each fiscal year since 1981. In addition to those providers who were granted continued approval during the 1984-85 year, ten new providers were approved while three providers ceased participation. At the close of the year on June 30, a total of 163 providers of continuing education held approval by the Board.

Nurses reported attendance at approximately 5,049 offerings to meet the licensure renewal requirement. In addition to in-state continuing education presentations, these offerings included completion of out-of-state, academic credit and self-study presentations.

As a result of the ongoing evaluation of the mandatory continuing education system, a re-evaluation of the process used for documentation of continuing education earning was under way at the end of the year. Similarly, the procedures for evaluation of programming content developed by approved providers were in the process of being assessed for possible revision.

In addition to these ongoing process evaluation strategies, the Board has also undertaken a descriptive research project designed to assess the perceived impact of the mandatory continuing education system on the Kentucky registered nurse and licensed practical nurse populations. It is anticipated that the results of this project will be available in the Spring of 1986.

There were one-hundred fifty-one (151) providers of mandatory continuing education located within the Commonwealth and twelve (12) located out-of-state for a total of one-hundred sixty-three (163) approved providers of mandatory continuing education for Kentucky nursing licensees. These providers were classified according to type of agency, and as of June 30, 1985, the categorical breakdown of providers was as follows: Professional Nursing Organizations (12); Related Nursing Organizations (2); Educational Institutions (30); Health Service Agencies (87); Health Related Organizations (17); Commercial Organizations (1); and Other (14).

Approval was granted to ten (10) providers of mandatory continuing education during the period of July 1, 1984 to June 30, 1985. During that period, three (3) providers ceased participation in the Board approved providership program and were designated as withdrawn or "WD"; (10 providers withdrew prior to July 1, 1984.)

NURSING PRACTICE

The Board of Nursing Practice Committee assists the Board in the interpretation of the legal scope of nursing practice as defined in KRS 314.011(5) Registered nursing practice and (9) Licensed practical nursing practice, and in the determination of safe and effective nursing care for the citizens of the Commonwealth. The Practice Committee and the Board reviewed approximately 60 inquiries on matters related to nursing practice issues; approximately 300 letters were sent to individuals in response to other inquiries regarding the practice of nursing. The Board revised previously adopted nursing practice statements to reflect that the statements were advisory opinions of the Board on what constitutes safe nursing practice, and that the opinions do not carry the force of law. In addition, the Board, through the recommendation of the Practice Committee, approved four (4) additional advisory opinion statements on the following nursing practice issues:

ROLE OF THE REGISTERED NURSE FIRST ASSISTANT
ROLE OF NURSES IN THE PERFORMANCE OF SURGICAL DEBRIDEMENT OF A
DECUBITUS ULCER
ROLES OF NURSES IN THE APPLICATION OF FETAL SCALP LEADS AND IN THE

ARTIFICIAL RUPTURE OF MEMBRANES FOR PATIENTS IN LABOR
ROLES OF NURSES IN THE INSERTION AND REMOVAL OF NASOGASTRIC TUBES

In May, 1985, the Board held a third annual nursing practice conference to disseminate information regarding nursing practice issues and Kentucky Board of Nursing advisory opinions to nursing service administrators and administrators of pre-licensure nursing education programs.

At the close of this year the Practice Committee, as directed by the Board, was in the process of studying various nursing practice issues including the role of the registered nurse in psychiatric and mental health nursing. Further, the Practice Committee was finalizing a draft of a proposed regulation for the issuance of a limited license to individuals who would practice nursing in a restricted capacity as defined in KRS 314.011(13).

INVESTIGATION AND DISCIPLINARY ACTION

Each year for the past seven years, the Board has received increasing numbers of complaints on nursing practice. For example, the total number of complaints received per annum doubled in less than a three year period. In addition, more applicants for licensure indicated previous criminal convictions. Such applications must be reviewed by at least one member of the Board before being processed. Although the number of hearings and disciplinary actions has increased during the past several years, the caseload has also continued to increase due to the volume of complaints received. New administrative regulations relevant to the investigation and disposition of complaints, and procedures for disciplinary hearings were adopted by the Legislative Research Commission and implemented by the Board. The regulations provide for the disposition of complaints by hearings, agreed orders and consent decrees.

The composition of the hearing panel was changed by regulation to two Board members with an assistant attorney general to serve as hearing officer. The hearing officer and one Board member may hear cases for reinstatement of revoked or suspended licenses and for removal of licenses from probation.

The Board also determined that Agreed Orders for probated licenses for individuals requesting reinstatement of revoked licenses or denied reinstatement of licenses will be considered when all requirements specified in the original decisions were met.

The increasing number of licensees on probation who were mandated to meet with a representative of the Board on a quarterly or semi-annual basis and submit written reports during the probationary period required additional staff time.

During 1985-86 hearings will need to be scheduled for both the current caseload of 57 active cases and, for the increased number of complaints projected for the coming year. The addition of a second nurse investigator and a full time attorney to Board staff is expected to expedite the handling of the large volume of cases.

The Board continued to follow the Guidelines for Determining the Need for Disciplinary Action on KRS Chapter 314 Violations and Conviction Records used for reviewing applications of those licensure applicants who have had a previous criminal conviction record. The guidelines expedited the review of suspected violations and/or conviction records, and gave direction to staff for handling these situations in a timely manner.

During the year, disciplinary orders of the Board were appealed by four disciplined licensees. The Board was notified that in one case, the circuit court had upheld its order, while in another case, the appeal was withdrawn. Action on one appeal filed in 1982-83, two in 1983-84, and two in 1984-85 was pending at the close of the year.

In May of 1985, a conference was held for nursing service administrators of all health care facilities and prelicensure nursing education programs in the Commonwealth. The conference content included a discussion of behaviors constituting grounds for disciplinary action and a summary of disciplinary actions taken by the Board.

During the year, a member of the Board staff served on the Governor's Task Force on Prescription Drug Abuse pursuant to a resolution adopted by the 1984 General Assembly.

One of the 1982 revisions to the Nursing Practice Act authorized the Board to issue limited licensees to handicapped but otherwise qualified applicants for licensure, and to persons disciplined by the Board. Prior to the implementation of the "limited license" concept, regulations must be adopted by the Board. Work continued on the regulation for implementation of this concept, and it is planned that the regulation will be adopted and submitted for approval during the 1985-86 year.

Disciplinary Actions

The Kentucky Nursing Practice Act provides that the Board of Nursing may "deny, limit, revoke, probate or suspend any license to practice nursing issued by the Board or applied for ... or to otherwise discipline a licensee or to deny admission to the licensure examination or to require evidence of evaluation and therapy" if an individual is in violation of the nursing law.

The Board has continued its efforts to make the public aware of the investigatory and disciplinary procedures and to emphasize the legal requirement and importance of reporting nurses who are engaging in unsafe or illegal practices.

Twenty-eight (28) decisions were entered, thirty-one (31) agreed orders, three (3) consent decrees and eight (8) staff recommendations were accepted by the Board for licensees and/or applicants and resulted in the actions illustrated in Table 7.

Two cases involving individuals posing as nurses were referred to the office of the Jefferson County Commonwealth Attorney for legal action.

Fifty-six (56) complaints for applicants with conviction records were handled on an informal basis during this period. No formal action was deemed necessary or possible for seventeen (17) complaints.

PART IV

LICENSURE AND REGISTRATION ACTIVITIES

Nurse Credentials and Licensure Requirements

The primary mission of the Board of Nursing is public protection. This mission continued to be accomplished through the licensure and registration of only those applicants who met statutory and regulatory requirements. All administrative regulations relevant to licensure requirements were revised by the Board, approved by the Legislative Research Commission and have been implemented.

Statistical data on licenses and registrations issued illustrated that the numbers of registered nurses had decreased slightly with little change in the number of advanced registered nurse practitioners. The statistics show an increase in the number of licensed practical nurses, however, because of biennial renewal, there was no renewal period for licensed practical nurses in 1984. As was the case during the previous year, the number of reinstated registered nurse licenses increased moderately, due primarily to licensee non-compliance with the relicensure continuing education requirement. There was a decrease in the number of licensees choosing to maintain current licensure on an inactive status rather than on an active status, the latter of which requires continuing education earnings.

Fiscal year 1982-83 was the last year of annual renewal of registered and licensed practical nurse licensure. Revisions in the 1982 Kentucky Nursing Practice Act provided for biennial licensure renewal beginning with the October 1983 renewal of licensed practical nurse licenses. Registered nurses were issued biennial licenses in October 1984. Advanced planning for this process was completed and an orderly transition to biennial licensure renewal was achieved.

The licenses of nurses were monitored by checking over 1400 lists of employed licensees submitted by employers of both registered and licensed practical nurses. This mechanism assists employers in the determination of qualifications of nurses both prior to employment and on an ongoing basis.

The participation of the Board in the Disciplinary Data Bank of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Inc. facilitated the detection of impostors and/or persons who have had action taken on licenses by other jurisdictions. Reports were received in the Board office on a monthly basis, and were routinely reviewed as a part of the procedure for licensure application review.

Licensure Examinations

Since the initiation of national licensure examinations for nurses in the late 1940s, the Kentucky Board of Nursing has adopted officially as its licensure examination, those examinations provided by the National League for Nursing Test Service and most recently by the CTB/McGraw-Hill Test Service, under the auspices of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing. Prior to the July 1982 examination, the title of the examination was the State Board Test Pool Examination (SBTPE). The new examination is entitled the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX), with the designation of either RN for registered nurses or PN for practical nurses. The licensure examinations are now scored by using a criterion-referenced scoring system instead of a norm-referenced scoring system.

The new comprehensive National Council Licensure Examination for registered nurse licensure, based on a revised test plan, consists of an examination with four parts and one score reported. Previously, any registered nurse candidate who failed any one test of the five part State Board Test Pool Examination, was not allowed to practice nursing until such time as all five tests were passed.

As was expected, with the initiation of the one score report for the total examination, the percentage pass-rate by the graduates on the licensure examination changed. The pass-rate of graduates from Kentucky programs increased and was found to be comparable to the national percentage pass-rate of all graduates who took the licensure examination for the first time.

These changes in scoring and format have facilitated the development and implementation of two mechanisms to assist candidates to prepare the licensure examination. A Diagnostic Assessment Program was made available for all candidates who wished to prepare for the examination by testing themselves via the use of a clinical simulated examination. candidates who were unsuccessful in passing the examination, a Diagnostic Profile Report was prepared, which illustrated areas of weakness according to the content requirements examination. It is hoped that both the Diagnostic Assessment Program and the Diagnostic Profile will assist candidates in preparing for examination and to achieve a passing score.

The Kentucky Board of Nursing has continued to follow the National Council of State Boards of Nursing procedure for responding to the needs of handicapped candidates. This procedure provides for modification of the administration of the examination to accommodate handicapped candidates in compliance with the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

The Board of Nursing continued to review all drafts of test items prepared by the test service for both registered and practical nurse licensure examinations, in order to assist with the construction of valid examinations. Further, two Kentucky nurses were selected by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing to be members of a panel of content experts for the practical nurse licensure examination.

Finally, it should be noted that the past year has shown a slight increase in candidates for licensure by examination as registered nurses, while the number of candidates for licensure by examination as licensed practical nurses was essentially the same as the previous year.

REGISTERED NURSE LICENSURE BY EXAMINATION

The Kentucky Nursing Practice Act states, "An applicant shall be required to pass a written examination in such subjects as the board may determine." This applies to applicants for registered nurse licensure and applicants for practical nurse licensure. The Kentucky Board of Nursing administers the National Council Licensure Examination to registered nurse and licensed practical nurse applicants. Statistics on the number of candidates writing for the first time and percent passing rate follow.

LICENSURE BY ENDORSEMENT

KRS 314.041(4) states, "The board may issue a license to practice nursing as a registered nurse to an applicant who has passed the state board test pool exam or an equivalent examination approved by the board and been licensed as a registered nurse under the laws of another state, territory or foreign country if in the opinion of the board the applicant is qualified to practice professional nursing in this state."

KRS 314.051(5) states, "The board may issue a license to practice as a licensed practical nurse to any applicant who has passed the state board test pool exam or an equivalent examination approved by the board and has been licensed or registered as a licensed practical nurse or a person licensed to perform similar services under a different title, under the laws of another state, territory or foreign country if, in the opinion of the board, the applicant meets the requirements for a licensed practical nurse in this state."

KRS 314.101(3) states "A temporary work permit may be issued by the board to persons who have completed the requirements for, applied for and paid the fee for licensure by examination or endorsement. Temporary work permits shall be issued only for the length of time required to process applications for endorsement or to conduct and determine the results of examinations and shall not be renewed. No temporary work permit shall be issued to an applicant who has failed the licensure examination."

As shown in Table 12, during fiscal year 1984-85, 48 more RNs and 63 more LPNs left Kentucky than came to Kentucky. The Commonwealth of Kentucky continues to be a supplier state for nursing manpower.

Advanced Registered Nurse Practitioners

Kentucky Revised Statutes 314.131(1) empowers the Board to register and designate those persons qualified to engage in advanced nursing practice. KRS 314.011(6) and (7) define advanced registered nurse practitioner, and advanced registered nursing practice. The Kentucky Board of Nursing registers qualified individuals as advanced registered nurse practitioners designated either as nurse anesthetist, nurse midwife, nurse practitioner, or nurse clinical specialist. During the past year 107 individuals were registered initially with the Board as advanced registered nurse practitioners. A summary report of advanced registered nurse practitioner registration is shown in Table 15.

As recommended by the Nurse Practice Council, the Board revised 201 KAR 20:056 Advanced registered nurse practitioner registration, program requirements, and recognition of a national certifying organization, and 201 KAR 20:057 Scope and standards of practice of advanced registered nurse practitioners. The Board reviewed the scope of practice statements for each speciality area as developed by national nursing organizations and incorporated the scope of practice statements into 201 KAR 20:057 by reference. Both regulations became effective May 14, 1985.

KENTUCKY NURSING LICENSES*

ISSUED JULY 1, 1984 - JUNE 30, 1985

The Kentucky Nursing Practice Act provides that, "The license of every person under the provisions of KRS 314 ... shall be renewed at least biennially ..." By administrative regulation 201 KAR 20:080, the Kentucky Board of Nursing has determined that the licensure period shall be November 1 - October 31. KRS 314.031 states, "It shall be unlawful for any person to call or hold himself out as or use the title of nurse or to practice or offer to practice as a nurse unless licensed under the provision of KRS 314 ..." Table 16 depicts licensure totals for the fiscal year.

PART V

KENTUCKY BOARD OF NURSING

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES 1984 - 1986

GOAL I

ENSURE THAT PERSONS LICENSED AS NURSES AND REGISTERED AS ADVANCED REGISTERED NURSE PRACTITIONERS IN KENTUCKY ARE QUALIFIED ACCORDING TO REQUIREMENTS TO PROVIDE THE CITIZENS OF THE COMMONWEALTH WITH SAFE AND EFFECTIVE NURSING CARE.

CONTINUING OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Approve prelicensure nursing education programs to promote competency of new graduates.
- 2. Approve providers of continuing education for nurses.
- 3. Approve agents for reviewing programs/offerings of continuing education for nurses.
- 4. Approve programs/offerings of continuing education to meet requirements for relicensure of nurses.
- 5. License and register qualified applicants to protect the the public.
- 6. Monitor licensure status of employed nurses to protect the public.
- 7. Investigate and resolve complaints to protect the public.
- 8. Deny, probate, suspend, limit or revoke licenses of incompetent applicants or nurses who have negligently or willfully acted in a manner inconsistent with the practice of nursing, to protect the public.

SHORT TERM OBJECTIVE:

1. Implement limited licensure status to protect the public.

GOAL II

OPTIMIZE EFFICIENCY OF BOARD AND OFFICE OPERATIONS TO IMPROVE SERVICES AND CONTROL OF EXPENDITURES.

CONTINUING OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Recruit qualified and competent persons for vacant staff positions.
- 2. Modify work planning and performance review (WPPR) system to promote staff efficiency.
- 3. Revise orientation program for Board and staff.
- 4. Promote Board decision making processes within a coordinated committee structure.
- 5. Maintain control of expenditures within budgetary projections.
- 6. Monitor space utilization and needs.
- 7. Project staffing needs for current and 1986-88 biennial periods.
- 8. Project finances and budget for 1986-88 biennium.

SHORT TERM OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Implement statewide accounting and reporting system (STARS) for accuracy of records.
- 2. Examine investigative and enforcement processes to regulate nurses and nursing practice.
- 3. Implement processes for acceptance of self-study to meet continuing education requirements.
- 4. Review mandatory continuing education processes and requirements for relicensure.

- 5. Review utilization of electronic data processing system to achieve optimum efficiency.
- 6. Review record keeping system to eliminate duplication.
- 7. Examine feasibility of staggered licensure renewal periods.
- 8. Adopt five-year plan for Board operation.

GOAL III

ASSERT LEADERSHIP IN STATE GOVERNMENT, NURSING EDUCATION, NURSING PRACTICE AND THE PUBLIC ARENA TO PROMOTE THE DELIVERY OF SAFE AND EFFECTIVE NURSING SERVICES.

CONTINUING OBJECTIVES:

- Inform nurses, state agencies, organizations, employers of nurses and the public at large of the regulations and policies adopted for public protection.
- 2. Continue active participation as a Member Board of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing to promote use of standards on a national scope.
- 3. Continue study of nursing practice issues for the adoption of opinion statements.
- 4. Cooperate with groups and organizations to assess nurses' needs for continuing education.
- 5. Cooperate with local, state and national organizations and agencies involved in health data collection and planning for nurse supply needs.
- 6. Maintain relationship with program for impaired nurses.

SHORT TERM OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Monitor prelicensure nursing student admissions and graduations to provide a data base.
- 2. Review all administrative regulations and policies for compliance with KRS Chapter 13A.
- 3. Accomplish promulgation of revised and new administrative regulations as authorized by Nursing Practice Act.
- 4. Promote active involvement of Advisory Council to gain broader input in accomplishing mission.
- 5. Review Nursing Practice Act for any needed revision.
