PREFACE

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the state government agency authorized by Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314, to approve and regulate nursing education and practice, to administer licensure examinations and license qualified graduates of approved prelicensure programs of nursing, to approve providers of continuing education, to license qualified nurse applicants, and to register and designate qualified advanced registered nurse practitioner applicants.

Four major goals were delineated at the onset of the 1986-88 biennium to provide guidance in fulfilling the statutory mission of the Board of Nursing. The 1986-87 ANNUAL REPORT of the Board of Nursing summarizes the functions carried out by the Board to accomplish its mission and goals. The major programs and activities of the Board of Nursing are encompassed within the mission and goals as described in this report and include: prelicensure nursing education, mandatory continuing education, nursing practice, credentials and licensure, investigation and disciplinary action, administrative regulations of the Board, office operation, and state and national involvement. Information is also provided on agency structures and finances.

Information contained throughout this 1986-87 ANNUAL REPORT of the Board of Nursing shows the depth and scope of the activities of Board members and staff, and it highlights the multi-faceted involvements of the Board of Nursing. The Report information documents that the Board of Nursing is achieving its statutory mission to protect the public by licensing and registering only those individuals who are competent and effective as nurse licensees.

The ongoing development and implementation of sound regulatory practices in the interest of public protection for the citizens of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, is a dynamic process. This process, augmented by two years of intensive study by the Board, has resulted in careful planning for the future. The Long Range Plan 1987-1992 document (included on pages 65 through 72) sets forth the goals and strategic approaches to meet the continuing need for protection of the public as mandated by the statutory mission of the Board.

COMPOSITION OF BOARD, COMMITTEES, COUNCILS AND STAFF

Board of Nursing - Structures and Operation

During the 1986-87 year, the study and planning effort of the Board continued. This work culminated in the adoption of a Long Range Plan which consists of three documents: 1) Statement on Mission, Broad Goals, and Assumptions; 2) Strategic Plan 1987-1992; and 3) Operational Plan 1987-1990. Built into the long range planning process is continued updating and evaluation of the total agency operation. In addition, an Information Resources Plan was drafted as mandated by the Kentucky Information Systems Commission, and work was initiated on development of a plan for personnel resources.

The 1982 revisions to the Nursing Practice Act included provisions for limiting licenses of persons with handicaps which affect the full scope of practice as nurses. An administrative regulation for this purpose became effective in 1986. To date, 353 applications for licensure were reviewed which resulted in 22 agreements for limited licensure status. Such status is noted on the licensure card.

An intense review of all administrative regulations of the Board was conducted during the year in preparation for the codification of administrative regulations as mandated by the 1986 Kentucky General Assembly. A bill request, as drafted by the Legislative Research Commission staff, was revised and submitted prior to the July 8, 1987 statutory deadline.

Study of the accreditation/approval process for continuing education for nurses by the Education Committee resulted in proposed revisions to administrative regulations. Also, procedures of the Board were reviewed with the goal to achieve congruity with the new American Nurses' Association guidelines.

The investigation and disciplinary action program of the Board continued to grow in volume of receipt and disposition of complaints. The increase in complaints received was moderate, however, the number of nurses monitored by the Board increased significantly to the point of requiring an additional nurse investigator. A new nurse investigator will join the staff in July 1987.

All meetings of the Board and its committees and councils were held in open session with the few exceptions as noted in the open meetings law. The meetings were advertised in the Board communications with licensees and the public as required. In total, the Board held six regular meetings including the annual meeting.

The reorganized standing committees and ad hoc committees of the Board, serving in an advisory capacity, continued to expedite the Board decision making process. The composition of the committees included volunteer members who provided valuable input from interested parties affected by regulatory practices.

As planned during 1985-86 for implementation during 1986-87, an expanded orientation program was conducted at a dinner meeting for all Board, committee, and council members. This general orientation session focused on regulatory issues and on Board structures and operations. In addition, individualized sessions held at the time of the first meeting of the various groups, enhanced the orientation for each group.

The finances of the Board continued to be monitored carefully in view of the increased scope and volume of functions, new costs for services as part of state government, and ongoing costs. The budget for 1986-87, as approved by the General Assembly, was revised within the legislative appropriations. Additionally, as part of budgetary planning, revenues and expenditures were projected for a five year period, and the past ten year finances of the Board were reviewed. Procedures were developed and implemented for investment of the agency's fund balance as authorized by the revision to the Nursing Practice Act passed by the 1986 General Assembly.

By the enactment of the 1986 Personnel Omnibus Bill which mandated revisions to KRS Chapter 18A, a new employee evaluation system was implemented. A smooth and efficient transition from the Modified Work Planning and Performance Review (WPPR) System to the Kentucky Employee Performance Evaluation System, was accomplished through the efforts of the branch managers and staff supervisors. Beginning in fiscal year 1988, pay for performance will be instituted for those employees who receive an "exceeds" rating on the year end evaluation for the 1987 calendar year.

During the annual meeting of the Board, the inaugural member and staff recognition for service ceremony was held. Eleven Board members and eleven staff members were awarded service pins denoting length of service and were extended appreciation for their contributions. It is planned for the coming year to expand the Recognition Program to include volunteer council and committee members.

The Board met seven times during the year 1986-87 for a total of twelve days. The Board members also participated in other activities including examinations and committee meetings. Thirty-three hearings were conducted by hearing panels which consisted of two Board members each. The members served equal time on the hearing panels. 



PART II

BOARD OF NURSING INVOLVEMENTS AND LEADERSHIP ACTIVITIES

Members and staff of the Board of Nursing actively participated in various local, state and national groups during the 1986-87 year. Representation to the following groups was continued: Kentucky Council of Associate Degree Nursing, Kentucky Nurses Association Board of Directors, KNA Cabinet on Nursing Education, KNA Cabinet on Continuing Education, Kentucky State Association of Licensed Practical Nurses, Kentucky Nursing Continuing Education Network, Advisory Committee of Nurses Assisting Nurses (NAN). A continuing representative appointment for the first time was made to the KNA Cabinet on Practice. In addition, individuals from the Board and staff membership served on the Convention Program Planning Committee of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN), as NCSBN representative to the Advisory Committee for the Statewide Nursing Study in Pennsylvania, and as a member of Kentucky Champions Against Drugs Statewide Action Group.

A request was received from the Board of Directors of the Kentucky Nurses Association to establish a task force to study the level of education that will be needed by future nurses. Along with this request and in view of the resolution supporting a study of nursing in the Commonwealth, as adopted by the Kentucky State Association of Licensed Practical Nurses in 1987, the Board of Nursing Study and Planning Committee spent considerable time in discussion of the need and feasibility of performing a study of nursing in the Commonwealth. Because of the ramifications and magnitude of such a project, the Board elected hold an invitational meeting with selected individuals and nursing representatives from various organizations to provide information and to obtain advice. The invitational meeting was held on April 9, 1987 with twenty-five invitees in attendance representing five individuals and nine organizations. An energetic discussion was held and resulted in the participants being requested to submit definitions of need and direction for nursing services for the citizens of the Commonwealth. A second meeting of the group was planned for the summer of 1987 to summarize discussion and to plan future activities.

The Board continued cooperation with local, state and national organizations and agencies involved with health data collection for nursing manpower needs. Also, data were released to the National Council of State Boards of Nursing relative to nurse licensure and disciplinary actions taken by the Board.

The Board maintained its active membership as a member board of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing. Representation was provided at the Delegate Assembly and Area III annual meetings of the National Council. Further, individuals were nominated for committee and panel appointments as requested by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing. Significant time was given by members of the Board and staff in the completion of questionnaires to provide data and to rank NCSBN goals and objectives.

To facilitate communication among all groups with whom the Board interacts, a second annual two-day conference was held for nursing service administrators, administrators of pre-licensure programs of nursing, and administrators of continuing education providerships. The theme of the conference was aptly titled, "Partners in Professional Practice." Approximately 250 individuals registered for the conference and provided evaluations for planning other conferences as well as actively participating in the conference.

As feasible, consultation services were provided by the Board and staff members to nursing education programs, to employers of nurses, providers of continuing education, and to other individuals and groups upon request. Over two hundred meetings/conferences were held with various individuals and groups.

Beyond the many internal meetings held by the Board, staff and members of the Board attended state and national meetings including Clearinghouse on Licensure Enforcement and Regulation (CLEAR) conferences sponsored by the Council of State Governments, National Conferences on the Impaired Nurse and on Prescription Drug Abuse, Professional Association Conventions, and meetings of the Federation of Associations of Regulatory Boards. Also, members participated in a number of state—wide meetings.

A proposed administrative regulation for the certification of physician assistants was analyzed and staff services were rendered as requested by various groups in the Commonwealth. A temporary restraining order, obtained near the end of the year, prohibited the Kentucky Board of Medical Licensure from implementing provisions of KRS Chapter 311 (Medical Practice Act) which authorize certification of physician assistants.

Four new advisory opinion statements were approved and published by the Board as follows: 1) "Roles of Nurses in the Implementation of Patient Care Orders", 2) "Roles of Nurses in the Supervision and Delegation of Nursing Acts to Unlicensed Personnel", 3) "Roles of Nurses in the Administration of Medications Via Various Routes", and 4) "Roles of Nurses in the Administration of Medications". The Board approved a revision to the advisory opinion statement, "Roles of Registered Nurse and Advanced Registered Nurse Practitioners in the Administration of Medications per Intraspinal Routes." As of June 30, 1987, the Kentucky Board of Nursing has published seventeen (17) advisory opinion statements. In addition, responses to forty-five (45) letters requesting opinions on various nursing practice issues were handled through the work of the Practice Committee. Information regarding opinions dealing with the practice of nursing was published in the Board newsletter, KBN COMMUNIQUE', and presented at the 1987 Annual Conference sponsored by the Board.

Of critical concern to organized nursing, officials in the public and private sectors, and employers of nurses, is the current supply of nurses to meet demand. Consistent with the national scene, prelicensure registered nurse programs of nursing in Kentucky reported in 1987 a decrease in enrollments by about twenty-one percent (21%) in comparison with 1986 enrollment figures. For the same period, practical nurse programs reported a forty-four percent (44%) decrease in number of students enrolled. An increase (9.8%) of graduates from baccalaureate degree nursing programs and a decrease (16.6%) of graduates from associate degree nursing programs for 1985 and 1986 were noticeable changes. A nine percent (9%) decrease in first time writers was projected for the July 1987 registered nurse examination in comparison with the July 1986 examination. Also, a six percent (6%) decrease in first time writers for licensed practical nurse examinations was noted from fiscal year 1985-1986 to 1986-1987. If enrollments continue to decrease, the number of licensed nurses in Kentucky overall, which in the past has shown continued moderate growth, will be affected.

Consistent with an advisory opinion adopted by the Board during 1985-86 year, the revisions recommended by the Nurse Practice Council to the administrative regulation on advanced registered nurse practitioners dealing with scopes the standards of practice, were in the process of being approved at the end nurse year. The revisions to the regulation will authorize advanced registered practitioners to prescribe therapies and medications according to the appropriate national certifying body statements on scopes and standards of practice and delineated in protocols.

Staff to the Council of State Governments requested representatives of the Board to meet with two individuals from the Office of Inspector General by HHS Department of Health and Human Services. Information was being collected to find methods to enhance enforcement of regulations that pertain to health care funding and insure competent health care providers

Issues of concern identified as needing continuing study and/or monitoring of the coming year included certification of physician assistants, in school nursing by unlicensed persons, provision of health/nursing care in and of settings, and impact of limited licensure status. These matters are themselves offer new challenges to the members and staff of the establishing sound regulatory practices for the benefit of all citizens of Commonwealth.

The Board and staff members are appreciative of the many individuals and sound whose interest, cooperation, and support assist the Board in achieving regulatory practices in the interest of public protection

Nursing Education


The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the legally authorized body in Kentucky to approve programs of nursing preparing persons for eligibility for licensure as nurses. Through the provisions of the Kentucky Nursing Practice Act, (KRS 314.011, 314.031, 314.111 and 314.131), the Board prescribes standards for schools of nursing preparing candidates for licensure as nurses. It provides for survey visits and other methods of determining program compliance with statutory and regulatory provisions.

Consultation to the nursing education programs was provided by staff and members of the Board.

Monitoring of the nursing education programs' compliance with Board regulations and guidelines was accomplished through the review of Annual Reports and Annual Faculty Summaries submitted by all nursing education programs preparing individuals for licensure as registered and licensed practical nurses. One program visit report was acted on by the Board and reports submitted by various nursing education programs to show evidence of compliance with requirements, were considered by the Board. Nursing education programs determined to be out of compliance with regulations of the Board were required to study and analyze the areas of non-compliance and submit plans for corrective action.

During the past year, approval was granted to Western Kentucky University to establish an extension of the Associate Degree Nursing Program in Glasgow, Kentucky. Students will be admitted to the Glasgow Extension program in the fall of 1987.

As of June 30, 1987, there were nine (9) generic baccalaureate, eighteen (18) associate degree and seventeen (17) practical nursing programs. In contrast, twenty years ago, there were four (4) generic baccalaureate, nine (9) associate degree, eleven (11) diploma and fifteen (15) practical nursing programs.

KY PRELICENSURE PROGRAM GRADUATES 82-87



Mandatory Continuing Education

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the Commonwealth agency legally authorized to approve providers of mandatory continuing education for nurses. In accordance with the Kentucky Nursing Practice Act (Kentucky Revised Statutes 314.073), the Board prescribes standards for both the providers of continuing education and for continuing education offerings/programs.

The approval program for providers of continuing education was initiated in 1981 to assure that continuing education offerings approved by the Board would be both available and accessible for nurses who were required to meet contact hour earnings for renewal of licenses for the first time in 1982. Since that time, the number of approved providers has stabilized, with approximately ten entities seeking approval each fiscal year since 1981. In addition to those providers who were granted continued approval during the 1986-87 year, eight new providers were approved while eight providers ceased participation, and were designated as withdrawn or "WD". At the close of the year on June 30, a total of 178 providers of continuing education held approval by the Board — one hundred sixty-five (165) providers were located within the Commonwealth and thirteen (13) were located out-of-state.


PROVIDERS

The procedures for evaluation of programming content developed by approved providers were assessed and the comparability of other organization's approval of providers was accepted.

Effective June 1, 1986, the Board no longer recorded continuing education contact hours earned by Kentucky registered nurse licensees. The new process for verification of continuing education earning will consist of a post-renewal audit procedure which will be instituted following the 1987 licensed practical nurse licensure renewal, and the 1988 registered nurse licensure renewal. The audit will be conducted on a random basis and will require that those persons selected show documented evidence (certificate of attendance, transcript, grade report etc.) of approved contact hour earning.

In addition to these ongoing process evaluation strategies, the Board has also undertaken a descriptive research project, "The Impact of Mandatory Continuing Education in Nursing as Perceived by Kentucky Licensees", designed to assess the perceived impact of the mandatory continuing education system on the Kentucky registered nurse and licensed practical nurse populations.

Nursing Practice

The Board interprets the legal scope of nursing practice according to Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314 and Board of Nursing Administrative Regulations in the determination of safe and effective nursing care for the citizens of the Commonwealth. The Practice Committee and the Board reviewed approximately 45 inquiries on matters related to nursing practice issues.

Since the formation of the Practice Committee in 1982, the Board has published and disseminated formal advisory opinion statements on seventeen (17) specific nursing practice issues which had been determined to be of general applicability to nursing practice. The Board, through the recommendation of the Practice Committee, approved or revised four (4) of the advisory opinion statements on the following nursing practice issues:

The Nursing Practice Act authorizes the Board to issue limited licenses to handicapped but otherwise qualified applicants for licensure, and to persons disciplined by the Board. A regulation relevant to limited licensure was adopted by the Legislative Research Commission on March 4, 1986 and the Board implemented procedures for limited licensure. The regulation provided for issuance of limited licensure to a qualified applicant/licensee who has a handicap or who has been subject to disciplinary action.

In April 1987, the Board held its annual conference which included dissemination of information regarding nursing practice issues and Kentucky Board of Nursing advisory opinion statements to administrators of nursing services, pre-licensure nursing education programs and continuing education providerships.

At the close of the year, the Practice Committee, as directed by the Board, was in the process of studying various nursing practice issues including the roles of nurses in a) the determination/pronouncement of death, b) the removal of hemodynamic monitoring catheters ("Swan-Ganz" catheters), c) the application and removal of skeletal traction, and d) working with physician assistants.

Investigation and Disciplinary Action

The total number of complaints received increased by three percent (3%) during the past year. More applicants for licensure indicated previous criminal convictions. Such applications were reviewed by one member of the Board before being processed. Although the number of hearings and disciplinary actions has increased during the past several years, the caseload has not decreased due to the volume of complaints carried forward from previous years. Administrative regulations relevant to the investigation and disposition of complaints, and procedures for disciplinary hearings, have been followed in the disposition of complaints by use of procedures for hearings, agreed orders and consent decrees.

The increasing number of licensees with limited or probated licenses who were mandated to meet with a representative of the Board on a quarterly or semi-annual basis and have written reports submitted during the probationary period, required additional staff time. The number of individuals with limited or probated licenses increased by nine percent (9%) during the past year.

During 1987-88, hearings will need to be scheduled for both the current caseload of 68 active cases and for the increased number of complaints projected for the coming year. The Board approved establishment of a third nurse investigator position. This additional staff person should expedite the handling of the number of active cases.

The Board continued to follow the Guidelines for Determining the Need for Disciplinary Action on KRS Chapter 314 Violations and Conviction Records used for reviewing applications of those licensure applicants who have had a previous criminal conviction(s) record. The guidelines assisted with the review of suspected violations and/or conviction records, and provided direction to staff for handling these situations in a timely manner.

During the year, there were no appeals of disciplinary orders of the Board.

In April 1987, a one and one half day conference was held for nursing service administrators of all health care facilities, administrators of prelicensure programs of nursing, and administrators of continuing education providerships in the Commonwealth. The conference content included a panel discussion of identifying and reporting behaviors constituting grounds for disciplinary action, Board process and procedures and a summary of disciplinary actions taken by the Board.

Revisions to the Nursing Practice Act which were adopted by the 1986 General Assembly which became effective on July 15, 1986, included procedures to provide for immediate temporary suspension of a license in order to protect the public, the authority for withdrawal of a temporary work permit when an applicant does not meet requirements or has disciplinary action pending in another jurisdiction, and penalties for the unlicensed practice of nursing in the Commonwealth. The revisions also raised the maximum civil penalties and fines which may be imposed by the Board or the Courts respectively.

Three members of the Board staff and one Board member have continued to serve on the Advisory Committee of Nurses Assisting Nurses (NAN), a project which was initiated by the University of Kentucky College of Nursing and designed to offer help to registered nurses with alcohol and drug problems and emotional stress. The Board collaborated with NAN in publishing a brochure entitled Nursing Licensure: Disciplinary Process and Procedures. The brochure was mailed to health care facilities throughout the Commonwealth.

Disciplinary Actions

The Kentucky Nursing Practice Act provides that the Board of Nursing may "deny, limit, revoke, probate or suspend any license to practice nursing issued by the Board or applied for ... or to otherwise discipline a licensee or to deny admission to the licensure examination or to require evidence of evaluation and therapy."

The Board has continued its efforts to make the public aware of the investigatory and disciplinary procedures and to emphasize the legal requirement and importance of reporting nurses who are engaging in unsafe or illegal practices.

Thirty-two (32) decisions were entered, fifty-six (56) agreed orders were approved, thirty-one (31) consent decrees were ratified and thirty-six (36) staff recommendations were accepted by the Board for licensees and/or applicants and resulted in the actions illustrated in Table 5.

Two cases involving individuals who posed as nurses and attempted to obtain employment as nurses, were investigated and information was published in the Board newsletter.

Eighty-two (82) complaints for applicants with conviction records were handled on an informal basis during this period. No formal action was deemed necessary or possible for nineteen (19) complaints. Ten (10) applications were filed away in cases where individuals could not be located, were deceased or criminal charges were dismissed.

PART IV

LICENSURE AND REGISTRATION ACTIVITIES

Nurse Credentials and Licensure Requirements

The primary mission of the Board of Nursing is public protection. This mission continued to be accomplished through the licensure and registration of only those applicants who met statutory and regulatory requirements. Administrative regulations relevant to licensure requirements have been followed during the past year.

Statistical data on licenses and registrations issued illustrated that the number of registered nurses and advanced registered nurse practitioners declined from the previous year, despite an almost identical number of first time licensure examination candidates and an increase in the number of registered nurses licensed by endorsement from other jurisdictions. Part of this decline can be attributed to the biennial renewal of registered nurses licensed during the fall of 1986 and part to the number of registered nurses leaving Kentucky for licensure in other jurisdictions (Verification of registered nurse licensure to other jurisdictions reached the highest level in ten years during 1986-87: 1,243.)

As was the case during the previous year for licensed practical nurse reinstatements, the number of reinstated registered nurse licenses increased significantly due primarily to licensee noncompliance with relicensure continuing education requirements. A small percentage (3.0%) of registered nurse licensees chose to maintain current licensure on an inactive status rather than on an active status, the latter of which requires continuing education earning.

Statistical data revealed an increase in the number of licensed practical nurse licensees despite a decline in the numbers of both first time licensure examination candidates and licensed practical nurses leaving the state for licensure in other jurisdictions. A portion of this increase is attributable to an increase in the number of licensed practical nurses licensed by endorsement from other jurisdictions. It was also noted that a small percentage (3.6%) of licensed practical nurse licensees chose to change current licensure status from inactive to active, allowing active practice in Kentucky.

The licenses of nurses were monitored by checking over 700 lists of employed licensees submitted by employers of both registered and licensed practical nurses. This mechanism assists employers in the determination of qualifications of nurses both prior to employment and on an ongoing basis. In addition, 1,950 registered nurses and 749 licensed practical nurse applicants for licensure were issued temporary work permits to expedite employment of nurses. (Permits are issued within three to five days after receipt of a completed application.)

The participation of the Board in the Disciplinary Data Bank of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Inc. facilitated the detection of impostors and/or persons who have had action taken on licenses by other jurisdictions. Reports were received in the Board office on a monthly basis, and were routinely reviewed as a part of the procedure for licensure application review.

Licensure Examinations

Since the initiation of national licensure examinations for nurses in the late 1940s, the Kentucky Board of Nursing has adopted officially as its licensure examination, those examinations provided by the National League for Nursing Test Service and most recently by the CTB/McGraw-Hill Test Service, under the auspices of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing. Prior to the July 1982 examination, the title of the examination was the State Board Test Pool Examination (SBTPE). Since 1982, the examination is entitled the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX), with the designation of either RN for registered nurses or PN for practical nurses. The licensure examinations (NCLEX) are scored by using a criterion-referenced scoring system instead of a norm-referenced scoring system.

The comprehensive National Council Licensure Examination for registered nurse licensure, based on a revised test plan, consists of an examination with four parts and one score reported. Previously, any registered nurse candidate who failed any one test of the five part State Board Test Pool Examination, was not allowed to practice nursing until such time as all five tests were passed.

As was expected with the initiation of the one score report for the total examination, the percentage pass-rate by the graduates on the licensure examination changed. The pass-rate of graduates from Kentucky programs increased and was found to be comparable to the national percentage pass-rate of all graduates who took the licensure examination for the first time.

A new Diagnostic Pretest to assist candidates to prepare for the licensure examination was developed by the test service to replace the Diagnostic Assessment Program. For those candidates who were unsuccessful in passing the licensure examination, a Diagnostic Profile Report is prepared. This Report illustrates areas of weakness according to the content requirements of the examination and indicates general testing areas for candidates to study in preparation for the next examination. The Diagnostic Assessment Program and the Diagnostic Profile should assist candidates in preparing to retake the examination and to achieve a passing score.

The Kentucky Board of Nursing has continued to follow the National Council of State Boards of Nursing procedure for responding to the needs of handicapped candidates. This procedure provides for modification of the administration of the examination to accommodate handicapped candidates in compliance with the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

The Board of Nursing decided to discontinue review of drafts of test items prepared by the test service for both registered nurse and practical nurse licensure examinations since all test items are reviewed by a panel of content experts. One Kentucky nurse was selected by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing to be an item writer for the registered nurse licensure examination during 1986-87.

Finally, it should be noted that the past year has shown a slight decrease in the number of candidates (first time writers) for licensure by examination as registered nurses, while the number of candidates (first time writers) for licensure by examination as licensed practical nurses remained approximately the same in comparison to the previous year.

Registered Nurse Licensure by Examination

The Kentucky Nursing Practice Act states, "An applicant shall be required to pass a written examination in such subjects as the board may determine." This applies to applicants for registered nurse licensure and applicants for practical nurse licensure. The Kentucky Board of Nursing administers the National Council Licensure Examination to registered nurse and licensed practical nurse applicants. Statistics on the number of candidates writing for the first time and percent passing rate follow.

Licensure by Endorsement

KRS 314.041(4) states, "The board may issue a license to practice nursing as a registered nurse to an applicant who has passed the state board test pool exam or an equivalent examination approved by the board and been licensed as a registered nurse under the laws of another state, territory or foreign country if in the opinion of the board the applicant is qualified to practice professional nursing in this state."

KRS 314.051(5) states, "The board may issue a license to practice as a licensed practical nurse to any applicant who has passed the state board test pool exam or an equivalent examination approved by the board and has been licensed or registered as a licensed practical nurse or a person licensed to perform similar services under a different title, under the laws of another state, territory or foreign country if, in the opinion of the board, the applicant meets the requirements for a licensed practical nurse in this state."

KRS 314.101(3) states "A temporary work permit may be issued by the board to persons who have completed the requirements for, applied for and paid the fee for licensure by examination or endorsement. Temporary work permits shall be issued only for the length of time required to process applications for endorsement or to conduct and determine the results of examinations and shall not be renewed. No temporary work permit shall be issued to an applicant who has failed the licensure examination."

As shown in Table 12, during fiscal year 1986-87, 221 more RNs and 151 more LPNs left Kentucky than came to Kentucky. The Commonwealth of Kentucky continues to be a supplier state for nursing manpower.

Advanced Registered Nurse Practitioners

Since 1978, Kentucky Revised Statutes 314.131(1) empower the Board to register and designate those persons qualified to engage in advanced nursing practice. KRS 314.011(6) and (7) define "advanced registered nurse practitioner" and "advanced registered nursing practice", respectively. The Kentucky Board of Nursing registers qualified individuals as advanced registered nurse practitioners designated either as nurse anesthetist, nurse midwife, nurse practitioner, or nurse clinical specialist. During the past year, 80 individuals were registered initially with the Board as advanced registered nurse practitioners. A summary report of advanced registered nurse practitioner registration is shown in Table 13.

The Nurse Practice Council reviewed proposed revisions to 201 Kentucky Administrative Regulation 20:057 Scope and standards of practice of advanced registered nurse practitioners, which clarified information to be included in an established protocol. At the close of this year, the Board had filed the proposed amended administrative regulation with the Legislative Research Commission.

Kentucky Nursing Licenses*

The Kentucky Nursing Practice Act provides that, "The license of every person under the provisions of KRS 314 ... shall be renewed at least biennially ..." By administrative regulation 201 KAR 20:080, the Kentucky Board of Nursing has determined that the licensure period shall be November 1 to October 31. KRS 314.031 states, "It shall be unlawful for any person to call or hold himself out as or use the title of nurse or to practice or offer to practice as a nurse unless licensed under the provision of KRS 314 ..." Table 14 depicts licensure totals for the fiscal year.

KENTUCKY BOARD OF NURSING

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES 1986 - 1987

GOAL I

ENSURE THAT PERSONS LICENSED AS NURSES AND REGISTERED AS ADVANCED REGISTERED NURSE PRACTITIONERS IN KENTUCKY ARE QUALIFIED ACCORDING TO REQUIREMENTS TO PROVIDE THE CITIZENS OF THE COMMONWEALTH WITH SAFE AND EFFECTIVE NURSING CARE.

CONTINUING OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Approve prelicensure nursing education programs to promote competency of new graduates.
- 2. Approve providers of continuing education for nurses.
- 3. Approve agents for reviewing programs/offerings of continuing education for nurses.
- 4. Approve programs/offerings of continuing education to meet requirements for relicensure of nurses.
- 5. License and register qualified applicants to protect the the public.
- 6. Monitor licensure status of employed nurses to protect the public.
- 7. Monitor the delivery of nursing services to ensure that only those individuals duly licensed under the provisions of KRS 314 are providing nursing as defined therein.
- 8. Investigate and resolve complaints to protect the public.
- 9. Deny, probate, suspend, limit or revoke licenses of incompetent applicants or nurses who have negligently or willfully acted in a manner inconsistent with the practice of nursing, to protect the public.

SHORT TERM OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Implement limited licensure status to protect the public.
- 2. Monitor regulatory proposals related to health care delivery.

GOAL II

OPTIMIZE EFFICIENCY OF BOARD AND OFFICE OPERATIONS TO IMPROVE SERVICES AND CONTROL OF EXPENDITURES.

CONTINUING OBJECTIVES:

- Recruit qualified and competent persons for vacant staff positions.
- 2. Implement position description and evaluation plan as mandated by the Department of Personnel.
- 3. Maintain orientation program for Board and staff.
- 4. Promote Board decision making processes within a coordinated committee structure.
- 5. Maintain control of expenditures within budgetary projections.
- 6. Monitor space utilization and needs.
- 7. Project staffing needs for the next biennial period.
- 8. Project finances and budget for the next biennium.
- 9. Maintain mandatory continuing education processes and requirements for relicensure.
- 10. Maintain statewide accounting and reporting system (STARS) for accuracy of records.
- 11. Develop and implement plan for total office automation.

SHORT TERM OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Implement and evaluate the auditing process for continuing education earning documentation.
- 2. Review record keeping system to eliminate duplication.
- 3. Examine feasibility of staggered licensure renewal periods.
- 4. Adopt five-year plan for Board operation.

GOAL III

ASSERT LEADERSHIP IN STATE GOVERNMENT, NURSING EDUCATION, NURSING PRACTICE AND THE PUBLIC ARENA TO PROMOTE THE DELIVERY OF SAFE AND EFFECTIVE NURSING SERVICES.

CONTINUING OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Review Nursing Practice Act for any needed revision.
- 2. Inform nurses, nursing students, state agencies, organizations, employers of nurses and the public at large of the regulations and policies adopted for public protection.
- 3. Continue active participation as a Member Board of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing to promote use of standards on a national scope.
- 4. Continue study of nursing practice issues for the adoption and revision of opinion statements.
- 5. Cooperate with groups and organizations to address nurses' needs for prelicensure and continuing education.
- 6. Cooperate with individuals and local state and national organizations and agencies involved in data collection and research related to nursing.
- 7. Maintain relationship with programs for impaired nurses.
- 8. Maintain a comprehensive data base of prelicensure and licensure populations to accomplish statutory and regulatory
- 9. Maintain involvement of Advisory Council for input in accomplishing goals.

SHORT TERM OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Monitor prelicensure student admissions and graduations to provide a data base.
- 2. Evaluate the continuing need for the Kentucky Board of Nursing Annual Conference.
- 3. Plan for the observance of the 75th Anniversary of the Kentucky Board of Nursing in 1989.
- 4. Implement 1986 revisions to the Kentucky Nursing Practice
- 5. Monitor implementation of other relevant legislation passed by the 1986 General Assembly.

LONG RANGE PLAN

INTRODUCTION

The purpose of long range planning is to provide direction for the agency based on its statutory charges and mission. To accomplish this purpose, the Study and Planning Committee of the Kentucky Board of Nursing prepared a comprehensive document which reflects current activities and future directions for the operation of the total agency.

MISSION AND ASSUMPTIONS

A statement on the mission and assumptions introduces the document. This part of the document includes broad goals adopted by the Board.

STRATEGIC PLAN

The strategic plan includes three major parts:

Statement of broad goals.

Statement of components (strategic goals) of each broad goal.

Statement of strategic approaches to accomplish the broad goals and respective components.

OPERATIONAL PLAN

The operational plan further specifies the strategic plan by the addition of the following:

Major activities for strategic approaches

Responsible work body

Decision-making body

Target date

The Strategic Plan extends over a three to five year period; the Operational Plan extends over a two to three year period. The latter may need revision/updating annually while the former should be reviewed and updated at least biennially.

DEFINITIONS

Mission Statement: The fundamental reasons for the existence of the organization. The statement defines the uniqueness of the organization and serves as a guide for the future.

Goal: A broad statement of outcome that contributes to the achievement of the mission.

Assumptions: Temporary estimates regarding important probable developments which cannot be predicted with accuracy and over which there is no significant control by the organization.

Strategy: A course of action to accomplish a goal.

- a. Strategic Goal: A statement which defines the components of a broad goal.
- b. Strategic Approach: A statement which includes selected methods for achieving a goal.

Major Activity: A specific work effort that results in a measurable outcome contributing to the achievement of a goal.

MISSION

The mission of the Commonwealth of Kentucky Board of Nursing is to enforce public policy related to the safe and effective practice of nursing in the interest of public welfare. In accomplishing its aims, the Board of Nursing licenses and registers qualified nurses and advanced registered nurse practitioners, approves providerships for mandatory continuing education and prelicensure programs of nursing, enforces the Nursing Practice Act, and issues nursing practice opinions. In addition, the Board of Nursing cooperates with individuals, groups, organizations, and other state and national entities by the provision of appropriate services to promote safe and effective nursing care for the citizens of the Commonwealth.

GOALS AND ASSUMPTIONS

ENSURE THAT PERSONS LICENSED AS NURSES AND REGISTERED AS ADVANCED GOAL I REGISTERED NURSE PRACTITIONERS IN KENTUCKY ARE QUALIFIED ACCORDING TO REQUIREMENTS TO PROVIDE THE CITIZENS OF THE COMMONWEALTH WITH SAFE AND EFFECTIVE NURSING CARE.

ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. Method of licensure examination administration will change.
- 2. More practices complaints will be reported.
- 3. Registered nursing practice will expand to include current scopes of advanced nursing practice.
- 4. Emphasis on determination of competency will continue.
- 5. Questioning of mandatory continuing education for validation of competency will increase.
- 6. Changes in educational requirements for licensure will occur.
- 7. Scope of nursing practice will expand for licensees.
- 8. Nursing curricula will change to reflect non-traditional delivery systems.
- 9. Prelicensure educational programs will require an internship/ preceptorship component.
- GOAL II OPTIMIZE HUMAN AND FISCAL RESOURCES TO IMPROVE SERVICES AND CONTROL COSTS.

ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. Automation will enhance Board operation.
- 2. Nurse manpower data will be valued and used.
- 3. An increase in fees or identification of other sources of revenue to maintain current level of services will be needed.
- 4. Difficulty for nurses and consumers to serve on KBN relative to time, energy, and conflicts will occur.
- 5. Changes in educational requirements for licensure will have ramifications for Board composition.

GOAL III

ASSERT LEADERSHIP IN STATE GOVERNMENT AND THE PUBLIC ARENA IN THE REGULATION OF NURSES, NURSING EDUCATION AND NURSING PRACTICE TO PROMOTE THE DELIVERY OF SAFE AND EFFECTIVE NURSING SERVICES.

ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. Shortages of nursing manpower will intensify.
- 2. Qualified students will select other professions.
- 3. A resurgence of monitoring KBN activities by other groups will occur.
- 4. The need for education regarding issues surrounding the regulation of nursing will continue.
- 5. Kentucky nurses will gain national prominence.
- 6. More nurses will be in independent practice.
- 7. The number of nurses employed outside of hospitals will increase.
- 8. Increase in non-licensed persons performing nursing duties will continue.
- 9. Efforts to implement institutional licensure will resurface.
- 10. Kentucky Legislature will consider reorganization of state government.
- 11. Inaccessability of health care for citizens will jeopardize public safety.
- 12. Corporate control of health care delivery systems will expand.
