PREFACE

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the state government agency authorized by Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314 (Kentucky Nursing Laws), to approve and regulate nursing education and practice, to administer licensure examinations and license qualified graduates of approved prelicensure programs of nursing, to approve providers of continuing education, to license qualified nurse applicants, and to register and designate qualified advanced registered nurse practitioner applicants.

Four major goals provide guidance in fulfilling the statutory mission of the Board of Nursing. The 1991-92 ANNUAL REPORT of the Board of Nursing summarizes the functions carried out by the Board to accomplish its mission and goals. The major programs and activities of the Board of Nursing are encompassed within the mission and goals as described in this Report and include: prelicensure nursing education, mandatory continuing education, nursing scholarship program, nursing practice, credentials and licensure, investigation and disciplinary action, administrative regulations of the Board, office operation, and state and national involvements. Information is also provided on agency structures and finances.

Information contained throughout this 1991-92 ANNUAL REPORT of the Board of Nursing shows the depth and scope of the activities of Board members and staff, and it highlights the multi-faceted involvements of the Board of Nursing. The Report information documents that the Board of Nursing is achieving its statutory mission to protect the public by licensing and registering only those individuals who are competent and effective as nurse licensees.

The ongoing development and implementation of sound regulatory practices in the interest of public protection for the citizens of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, is a dynamic process. The Long Range Plan 1993-1997 document (included on pages 81 through 87) sets forth the goals and strategic approaches to meet the continuing need for protection of the public as mandated by the statutory mission of the Board.

LICENSURE STATUS

CURRENT:

A license which has been renewed for a biennial period which

includes the current date.

ACTIVE:

Licensure status which authorizes the holder to use the appropriate licensure title designation (registered nurse, advanced registered nurse practitioner or licensed practical nurse) and engage in the legal scope of practice in the

Commonwealth.

INACTIVE:

Licensure status which authorizes the holder to use the appropriate licensure title, but <u>not</u> to engage in the legal scope of nursing practice in the Commonwealth. N.B. Individuals holding inactive licensure status, regardless of state of residence receive <u>all</u> routine mailings from the Board including the newsletter (<u>Communique</u>') which is

published three times annually.

EMPLOYMENT STATUS

FULL TIME:

Employed in nursing practice 40 hours or more per week or

in full time capacity as designated by employer.

PART TIME:

Employed in nursing practice less than 40 hours per week or

in part time capacity as designated by employer.

NON-NURSING

FIELD:

Employed in an capacity not requiring nursing education

and licensure.

UNEMPLOYED:

Not employed in any capacity; not officially retired.

RETIRED:

Retired from employment arena.

"UNKN":

Unknown, missing data.

REGISTERED

NURSE:

An individual licensed in the Commonwealth as a registered

nurse as authorized and defined by KRS 314.

LICENSED PRACTICAL NURSE: An individual licensed in the Commonwealth as a licensed practical nurse as authorized and defined by KRS 314.

ADVANCED REGISTERED

NURSE PRACTITIONER: An individual who holds licensure as a registered nurse and is registered and designated as an advanced registered nurse practitioner as authorized and defined in KRS 314. Advanced registered nursing practice includes but is not limited to the designations of: nurse anesthetist, nurse midwife, nurse practitioner, and clinical specialist.

"Combination" designation denotes an individual who is

authorized to practice in two or more designations. The designations are noted as:

ARNP A = nurse anesthetist

ARNP M = nurse midwife

ARNP P = nurse practitioner

ARNP S = clinical specialist

ARNP C = combination

DIPLOMA RN: Documentation of completion of an educational program

MSN: Master's of Science Degree in Nursing. Documentation of

PN/VOC SCH: Practical nurse vocational school. Type of prelicensure

education program (school) preparing candidate for licensed practical nurse licensure examination. All but two of these prelicensure programs in the Commonwealth are housed in the

vocational educational system; two are private institutions.

ED. EQUIV: Educational equivalent. Indicates those licensed practical

nurses originally licensed under the provisions of a 1950 legislative exemption from demonstrating completion of a

Board approved prelicensure program.

NSG EXP: Nursing Experience. Indicates those licensed practical

nurses originally licensed under the provisions of a 1950 legislative exemption from demonstrating completion of a Board approved prelicensure program. (During the two-year exemption period, nursing experience may have substituted

for "educational equivalent" above.)

COMPOSITION OF BOARD, COMMITTEES, COUNCILS AND STAFF

BOARD OF NURSING - STRUCTURES AND OPERATION

The past year was a year of change for the Board of Nursing. In addition to the ongoing issues facing all regulatory agencies at this time, Kentucky Nursing Laws (KRS Chapter 314) were amended and the Board of Nursing agency moved to a new location.

Negotiation of the agency office lease was handled through the Division of Real Properties of the Finance and Administration Cabinet after bids were let for the lease. The lease, in effect for the past six years, was to expire on June 30, 1992. After receipt of proposals, the agency was directed to move to its new location according to regulatory procedures involving the negotiation of leases for office space within state government.

The 1992 Kentucky General Assembly enacted a number of revisions to Kentucky Nursing Laws (KRS Chapter 314) effective July 15, 1992. The revisions to the Laws included the addition of a definition for "delegation", and the amendment of definitions for registered nursing practice and licensed practical nursing practice by adding the components of medication administration and delegation language. A number of the laws were updated to use current language. Changes made to the laws covering the Nursing Incentive Scholarship Fund should expedite procedures for the award of such scholarships. A requirement that licensure applicants be able to understandably speak, read, and write English was Changes were made in the laws to reflect current practices and to included. streamline the provider approval process concerning the mandatory continuing The revised laws for handling complaints against nurses education program. should expedite disciplinary procedures. The new Laws provide for exemptions from licensure to allow students enrolled in graduate programs of nursing to engage in the practice of nursing, which is incidental to their course of study. The composition of the Board membership included the addition of a new registered nurse member who will be nominated by the Kentucky Association of Nonprofit Homes and Services for the Aging, Inc. With this change, the Board of Nursing membership increases to thirteen members. Another new provision allows the Board to order a mental or physical examination of a nurse when there is a question of the nurse's competency or a matter involving drug or alcohol abuse. The maximum civil penalty which the Board can levy for a violation of the Nursing Laws was increased from \$1,000 to \$10,000. Lastly, two new nurse members were added to the Nurse Practice Council to represent the Kentucky Hospital Association and the Kentucky Association of Health Care Facilities.

The development and implementation of the Nursing Incentive Scholarship Fund Program, enacted by 1990 legislation, involved intense work with gratifying results. A total of \$87,050 was awarded to 58 prelicensure nursing students (56 prelicensure registered nursing students and 2 licensed practical nursing students). Of the 58 scholarship recipients, 24 were licensed practical nurses enrolled in registered nursing programs. The Board is pleased to announce that 15 of the scholarship recipients completed their program of nursing and graduated in May 1992. The volume of application forms (1200) mailed and applications (154) received in 1991 demonstrates the need for this program. Overall, there has been a highly favorable response to the program by both applicants and sponsors who match the monies collected and awarded through this program. Data on 1991 scholarship recipients by type of RN

prelicensure program, type of sponsoring facility, and geographic distribution indicate a mix of programs and facilities statewide.

As of June 16, 1992, again a high volume of application forms (1,069) were requested and 93 completed application forms have been returned. Fifty-four recipients awarded scholarships in 1991 are eligible for continuation and are being considered for scholarships during the coming year. Decisions on the 1992 scholarship awards will be made in July 1992. Parenthetically, scholarships may be awarded for graduate nursing studies as enacted by 1992 legislation to become effective in July 1992.

Through its study and planning activities, the Board continues to update the Long Range Plan which consists of three documents: 1) Statement on Mission, Broad Goals and Assumptions; 2) Strategic Plan 1993-1997; and 3) Operational Plan 1993-1995. The long range planning process includes not only updating of the plan but evaluation of the total agency operation as well. An Information Resources Plan, as mandated by the Kentucky Information Systems Commission, also was updated to provide continuing direction for efficiency in operations. Further, the plan for development of personnel resources, including the Affirmative Action Plan for the Board, was revised, and the biennial budget was revised to accommodate fiscal changes mandated by the 1992 Kentucky General Assembly.

All meetings of the Board and its committees and councils were held in open session except for the few exemptions as allowed in the open meetings law. The meetings were advertised in the Board communications with licensees and the public as required. In total, the Board held one special and six regular meetings including the annual meeting. The standing and ad hoc committees of the Board, serving in an advisory capacity, continued to expedite the Board decision making processes. The composition of the committees included volunteer members who provided a broader based perspective and viewpoint of interested parties and groups affected by regulatory practices.

The orientation program, as expanded in 1986, was continued. A dinner meeting for all Board, committee and council members was held as part of the orientation program. This general session included a discussion of regulatory issues and information on Board structures and operation. In addition, sessions held at the time of the first meeting of the various groups, enhanced the orientation for each group by focusing on specific programs and issues.

In a time of continuing fiscal constraint, the finances of the Board were again monitored carefully. As part of the budgetary planning process, revenues and expenditures were projected for a five year period, and the past ten year finances of the Board were reviewed. Additionally, investment of the agency's fund balance, as authorized by the revision to the Nursing Practice Act passed by the 1986 General Assembly, was diligently carried out according to approved procedures of the Office for Investment and Debt Management.

In compliance with the enactment of the 1986 Personnel Omnibus Bill, which mandated revisions to KRS Chapter 18A, the Kentucky Employee Performance Evaluation System, implemented during the 1987 year, was once again refined by staff managers and supervisors. This refinement of the system included participation in the audits of staff evaluations performed by the Department of Personnel.

The commitment of the members of the Board and the dedication of its staff continued in unabated fashion. Appreciation for this service by Board staff and members was expressed through the recognition programs of the agency and executive branch of state government. 

PART II

BOARD OF NURSING INVOLVEMENTS AND LEADERSHIP ACTIVITIES

The continuing need for nurse manpower was the focus of many activities this past year. Legislative and other proposals abounded with particular attention being given to the use of assistive personnel both at the federal and state levels. This issue was studied in depth with results that have significantly affected the use of assistive personnel relative to the medication nurse aide curriculum project with the Cabinet for Human Resources and the proposed administrative regulation on the use of assistive personnel. Though resolution of these issues seems slow, there is progress. Maintaining the integrity of the regulation of nursing is an overriding concern, however, other relevant groups have demonstrated an increasing recognition of the existence and need for involvement of the regulatory body charged with the regulation of nursing in the Commonwealth.

Recent federal mandates affecting nursing regulation include the national practitioner data bank (1986 and 1988), persons with disabilities (1990), the training and evaluation of nurse aides (1987, 1989 and 1990) and nurse practitioner reimbursement (1991). It can be expected that federal mandates will increasingly involve the regulation of nursing. Thus, it is incumbent upon nursing groups to be prepared to respond proactively and to continue communication and liaison relationships with the various groups involved.

Issues involving continued work with other groups included delegation and assistive personnel, faculty/student nurse ratios and faculty qualifications, school health, emergency medical technicians and services, physician assistants, advanced registered nurse prescription privileges, and pharmacy administrative regulations. These issues were discussed in depth at Board discussion sessions, public forums, and at Board committee and regular meetings.

As previously reported, development work on the proposal for a statewide demonstration project using a case management and differentiated nursing practice model was finalized in late 1990. A proposal for funding this project, known as the Kentucky Nursing Practice Project, was submitted to the Department of Health and Human Services in October 1989. During this past year, information was received that the project was not funded despite the very high rating given by reviewers. Though the option to resubmit the proposal exists, it is not being given consideration at this time. Again, the Board expresses appreciation to the many individuals and groups who contributed to this excellent and worthwhile project.

KBN members and staff actively participated in the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN). During the past year, the computer adaptive testing (CAT) project was approved for implementation by the August 1991 NCSBN Delegate Assembly. This CAT project, projected to begin in 1994, will change the administration of NCLEX to a computerized adaptive mode whereby the examination will be tailored to individual candidate competency. In addition, licensure examinations administered to candidates were reviewed by the Board and comments were forwarded to the National Council. Based on a revised NCLEX-RN Test Plan, the passing standard for the examination was increased effective July 1992. These efforts, along with other Board member and staff involvements in NCSBN activities, have provided a strong voice from Kentucky at the national level.

 ${\it Communications}$ of Board actions were enhanced by providing a Summary of Major ${\it Actions}$ within two weeks of each meeting held by the Board. Though the minutes actions have been and continue to be widely distributed, the Summary of the meetings information in a more timely manner.

of critical concern to nurses, officials in the public and private sectors, and of loyers of nurses, is the ever increasing demand for nursing services. Since employers of academic year, the data indicate a continued growth in nursing the enrollments and graduations.

Prelicensure programs of nursing in Kentucky reported an 18% increase in registered nurse graduates and a 29% increase in practical nurse graduates during 1990-91. There was a 16% increase in first-time writers for NCLEX-RN from fiscal year 1990-91 to 1991-92, and a 12.5% increase in NCLEX-PN first-time writers for 1991-92 in comparison with 1990-91. There is a 23% increase in first time writers projected for the July 1992 NCLEX-RN as compared to July 1991. Kentucky educated first-time NCLEX-RN writers averaged a 96% pass rate during 1990-91 while NCLEX-PN first-time writers averaged a 90% pass rate. (The average pass rates nationally for RN and PN first-time writers are about 91% and 86% respectively.) The Kentucky nursing educators are to be commended for this achievement.

PART III

BOARD ADMINISTRATIVE PROGRAMS

Introduction

The programmatic functions of the Board of Nursing expanded not only in volume and complexity but increased by new programs mandated by legislation. Additionally, the shortage of nurses has precipitated a need to expedite regulatory processes in an effort to conserve scarce manpower resources while at the same time maintaining standards to assure safe and effective care. A review of all regulatory procedures currently in effect was continued with the objective to both facilitate and enhance sound regulatory practices in view of budget restraints and workload.

A post-renewal audit to determine licensee compliance with continuing education earning requirements was conducted following the 1990 RN and 1991 LPN licensure renewal periods and will be conducted again following the 1992 RN licensure renewal period. An average of 3% of the audited population has had disciplinary action by the Board for failure to comply with continuing education earning requirements.

Ten on-site survey visits of prelicensure programs of nursing were conducted to monitor compliance with requirements. There are currently 49 educational institutions which operate a total of 11 BSN, 26 ADN, and 25 LPN prelicensure programs of nursing. In addition, one application to establish an associate degree extension program was accepted.

In response to inquiries requesting interpretation of the legal scope of nursing practice, the Board has published a total of 28 advisory opinion statements as guidelines for safe practice. Also, during this past year in response to inquiries, the Board issued the following Advisory Opinion Statements: "Roles of Nurses in the Delivery of Pre-hospital Emergency Medical Care Via Ambulance Services", "Components of Licensed Practical Nursing Practice", and "Roles of Nurses and Unlicensed Personnel in Endoscopic Procedures." The Board studied and issued individual advisory opinions on 23 specific nursing practice issues.

An administrative regulation on delegation of nursing activities to unlicensed persons was drafted and distributed for public comment. The Board continues to seek comment on the draft regulation and will consider promulgation of the regulation in the coming year. In addition, during the coming year the following issues will continue to be addressed: the roles and educational preparation of registered nurses in the delivery of pre-hospital emergency care via ambulance services, supplying and dispensing medications to clients, performance of copper vapor laser procedures by RNs, and school health issues.

A major issue facing the Board of Nursing concerns the processing of complaints against nurses who are impaired by chemical use and/or stress. In its continuing study of this matter, the Board developed a survey tool which was sent to nurses who have completed terms for disciplinary action taken on their licenses during the preceding five years. The purpose was to collect data to assist the Board in making decisions regarding disciplinary action in cases involving impairment. The Board is reviewing the questionnaire results for internal study and possible publication of aggregate data.

The investigation and disciplinary action program of the Board continued to grow during the past year. There continued to be an increase in the number of

complaints received and processed in 1991-92 in comparison to 1990-91 data. The number of nurses monitored by the Board increased by 26%. The Credentials Review Panel, by considering and making recommendations regarding cases which fall outside precedent, has assisted with processing of complaints in a timely manner.

Another time consuming project was implementation of the AIDS mandatory education requirement enacted into law in 1990 for all nurse licensees. Board staff worked closely with staff of the Cabinet for Human Resources who approve content to meet the two hour requirement. This mutually cooperative effort has resulted in a more effective and efficient process for all affected health care licensees.

Significant issues are facing the profession of nursing with attendant implications for the regulation of nurses. The members and staff of the Board of Nursing look forward to continued cooperative efforts with the Kentucky Nurses Association for resolution of these issues to ensure safe practice of nursing for the citizens of the Commonwealth. Again, the Board and staff members are appreciative of the many individuals and groups whose interest, cooperation and support assist the Board in achieving sound regulatory practices in the interest of public protection.

Nursing Education

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the legally authorized body in Kentucky to approve programs of nursing preparing persons for eligibility for licensure as nurses. Through the provisions of the Kentucky Nursing Laws, (KRS 314.011, 314.031, 314.111 and 314.131), the Board prescribes standards for schools of nursing preparing candidates for licensure as nurses. It provides for survey visits and other methods of determining program compliance with statutory and regulatory provisions. Consultation to nursing education programs was provided by the staff and members of the Board.

Monitoring of the nursing education programs' compliance with Board regulations and guidelines was accomplished through the review of Annual Reports and Annual Faculty Summaries submitted by all nursing education programs preparing individuals for licensure as registered or licensed practical nurses. Nine (9) program visit reports were acted on by the Board. Reports submitted by various nursing education programs to show evidence of compliance with requirements, were also considered by the Board. Nursing education programs determined to be out of compliance with regulations of the Board were required to study and analyze the areas of noncompliance and to implement plans for corrective action.

During the past year, applications to establish two (2) associate degree nursing (ADN) programs were accepted by the Board. Initial approval was granted to one (1) associate degree nursing program experimental tract (Southeast Community College in conjunction with Cumberland Valley Health Occupations Center) and two (2) practical nursing extension programs (Mt. Vernon Extension of the Cumberland Valley Health Occupations Center, and Mt. Sterling Extension of the Rowan State Vocational Technical School). The Pennyrile Regional Associate Degree Nursing Program changed governance to become two (2) separate ADN programs at Hopkinsville Community College and Madisonville Community College.

As of June 30, 1992, there were forty-eight (48) educational institutions operating eleven (11) generic baccalaureate, twenty-six (26) associate degree, and twenty-five (25) practical nursing programs.



Mandatory Continuing Education

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the Commonwealth agency legally authorized to approve providers of mandatory continuing education for nurses. In accordance with the Kentucky Nursing Laws (Kentucky Revised Statutes 314.073), the Board prescribes standards for the providers of nursing continuing education.

The approval of providers of continuing education was initiated in 1981 to assure that continuing education offerings approved by the Board would be both available and accessible for nurses who were required to meet contact hour earnings for renewal of licenses for the first time in 1982. In addition to those providers who were granted continued approval during the 1991-92 year, ten new providers were approved while two providers ceased participation. At the close of the year on June 30, a total of 163 active providers of continuing education held approval by the Board. Geographically, these providers are located throughout 58 instate communities and 8 other states.

The process for verification of continuing education earning by Kentucky nurse licensees consists of a post-renewal audit procedure. This process used for verification of earning of both the 30 contact hour and the newly required 2 contact hour programming in Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS) mandated for all health care licensees by the 1990 General Assembly. The audit is conducted on a random basis and requires that those persons selected show documented evidence (certificate of attendance, transcript, grade report, etc.) of approved contact hour earning.

Nursing Practice

The Board interprets the legal scope of nursing practice according to Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314 and Board of Nursing Administrative Regulations in the determination of safe and effective nursing care for the citizens of the Commonwealth.

In response to inquiries requesting interpretation of the legal scope of nursing practice, the Board has published and disseminated a total of twenty-eight (28) advisory opinion statements as guidelines for safe practice. During 1991-92, the Board approved Advisory Opinion Statements as follow: "Roles of Nurses in the Delivery of Prehospital Emergency Medical Care Via Ambulance Services" (AOS 91-26), "Components of Licensed Practical Nursing Practice" (AOS 92-27), and "Roles of Nurses and Unlicensed Personnel in Endoscopic Procedures" (AOS 92-28).

In addition, the following statements were revised: "Roles of Nurses in Intravenous Therapy Practice" (AOS 83/89 B-O3), "Roles of RNs and ARNPs in the Administration of Medication via Intraspinal Routes" (AOS 84-O4), "Roles of Nurses in the Care of Intrapartum Patients" (85-10), "Roles of Nurses in the Administration of Medication Via Various Routes" (AOS 87-16), and "Roles of Nurses in the Administration of 'PRN' Medication (AOS 87-17).

Market State of State

The Board held meetings with an ad hoc committee to address the role and scope of practice of nurses in the delivery of prehospital emergency medical care.

At the close of the year, the Practice Committee was in the process of studying various nursing practice issues including the promulgation of administrative regulations governing the delegation of nursing activities to unlicensed persons; school nursing practice; dispensing of medications via an emergency room; limited licensure status for the disabled and licensure of nurses who are HIV or HBV seropositive.

In addition, responses to twenty-three (23) letters requesting opinions on various nursing practice issues were handled through the work of the Practice Committee.

The Kentucky Nursing Laws authorize the Board to issue limited licenses to handicapped but otherwise qualified applicants for licensure. As of June 1992, limited licenses were issued to twenty-seven (27) individuals who reported handicaps that may impair their ability to safely perform the full scope of nursing practice. The Board is continuing to collect data on individuals who self-report health conditions which may affect practice as a nurse, and to evaluate the issuance of a limited license to the disabled nurse.

Investigation and Disciplinary Action

The total number of complaints received increased by eleven percent (11%) during the past year. The caseload has not decreased significantly, due to the large increase in the number of complaints and the volume carried forward from the previous year. Twenty-seven (27) complaints were entered for individuals who failed to meet continuing education requirements for renewal of license and forty-six (46) for new licensees who did not meet the requirement for AIDS continuing education within a six month period as specified in KRS Chapter 314. Administrative regulations relevant to the investigation and disposition of complaints and procedures for disciplinary hearings, have been followed in the disposition of complaints through the use of hearings, agreed orders and consent decrees. Records for applicants who indicated previous criminal convictions were reviewed by one (1) member of the Board before being processed.

The twenty-two percent (22%) increase in the number of licensees with limited or probated licenses who were mandated to meet with a representative of the Board on a quarterly or semiannual basis, have written reports submitted during the probationary period and meet various other requirements, required additional staff time.

During 1992-93 disciplinary action will need to be considered for both the current caseload of 215 active cases and for the complaints projected to be received during the coming year. Please refer to Table 5.

Board Guidelines for Determining the Need for Disciplinary Action on KRS 314 Violations and Conviction Records were used for reviewing applications of those licensure applicants who have had a previous criminal conviction record, or previous disciplinary action in another jurisdiction. These guidelines have assisted with the review of conviction records, and provided direction to staff for handling these situations in a timely manner.

During the past year, a Credentials Review Panel with a membership of two (2) Board members considered those matters related to licensure credentials and disciplinary investigation and action not otherwise covered by guidelines set by the Board of Nursing and applicable laws and regulations. This panel's recommendations regarding cases which fall outside of available precedent have continued to aid in the processing of complaints.

During the year, there were three (3) appeals of disciplinary orders of the Board.

Disciplinary Actions

The Kentucky Nursing Laws provides that the Board of Nursing may "deny, limit, revoke, probate or suspend any license to practice nursing issued by the Board or applied for ... or to otherwise discipline a licensee or to deny admission to the licensure examination, or to require evidence of evaluation and therapy..."

The Board has continued its efforts to make the public aware of the investigatory and disciplinary procedures and to emphasize the legal requirement and importance of reporting nurses who are suspected of engaging in unsafe or illegal practices.

All disciplinary actions are published in the Kentucky Board of Nursing newsletter. The Board participates in the National Council of State Boards of Nursing Disciplinary Data Bank which provides monthly reports to all participants of disciplinary action taken by Boards of Nursing throughout the United States. Reports were received in the Board office on a monthly basis, and were routinely reviewed as a part of the procedure for licensure application review.

Forty-six (46) decisions were entered, seventy-seven (77) agreed orders were approved, and sixty-eight (68) consent decrees were ratified by the Board for licensees and/or applicants and resulted in the actions illustrated in Table 5. Thirty (30) staff recommendations for removal from probation were approved by the Board.

PART IV

LICENSURE AND REGISTRATION ACTIVITIES

Nurse Credentials and Licensure Requirements

The primary mission of the Board of Nursing is public protection. This mission continued to be accomplished through the licensure and registration of only those applicants who met statutory and regulatory requirements. Administrative regulations relevant to licensure requirements have been followed during the past year.

REGISTERED NURSE/ADVANCED REGISTERED NURSE DATA

Given the continuing national and statewide concern regarding the shortage of licensed nurses, the fiscal year licensure statistics have been given careful scrutiny. As illustrated in Table 20, the total number of registered nurse (RN) licensees increased by 8.5% in fiscal year 1992 following less than 1% increase the prior year. The number of advanced registered nurse practitioners (ARNPs) increased from 946 to 1,087 with the largest percentage increase by specialty type occurring in nurse anesthetist registrations (15%).

LICENSED PRACTICAL NURSE DATA

While the number of new graduates from Kentucky prelicensure licensed practical nurse programs increased (10%) from the previous year, the total number of licensed practical nurses licensed in the Commonwealth increased by 10% during fiscal year 1991 following a 10% increase the previous year.

VERIFICATION/ENDORSEMENT DATA

A review of verification and endorsement data reveals that Kentucky continues to be a "supplier" state, with more licensees being verified for licensure in other jurisdictions (verification total 1,547) than being endorsed for Kentucky licensure from other jurisdictions (endorsement total 1,551). This pattern has been consistent for the past decade.

ACTIVE LICENSURE DATA

Finally, the percentage of licensees holding active licensure status (which allows for active practice in Kentucky) has remained stable during the past two fiscal years. Eighty-eight percent (88%) of both the licensed practical nurse and the registered nurse populations hold active licensure, figures which fluctuate an average of 1-3% annually. This high percentage of licensure population in the available employment pool is consistent with national nursing licensure population norms.

TEMPORARY WORK PERMIT DATA

During 1991-92, registered nurse and licensed practical nurse applicants for licensure were issued temporary work permits to expedite nursing employment. (Permits are issued within five days of receipt of a completed application form.)

Licensure Examinations

Since the initiation of national licensure examinations for nurses in the late 1940s, the Kentucky Board of Nursing has adopted officially as its licensure examination, those examinations provided by the National League for Nursing Test Service and most recently by the CTB/McGraw-Hill Test Service, under the auspices of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Inc. (NCSBN). Prior to the July 1982 examination, the title of the examination was the State Board Test Pool Examination (SBTPE). Since 1982, the examination is entitled the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX), with the designation of either RN for registered nurses or PN for practical nurses. The licensure examinations (NCLEX) are scored by using a criterion-referenced scoring system instead of a norm-referenced scoring system. Effective with the October 1988 examination, the National Council of State Boards of Nursing instituted pass/fail reporting of examination results; scores are no longer reported by the test service.

The comprehensive National Council Licensure Examination for registered nurse licensure, based on a revised test plan, consists of an examination with four parts with one score/result reported. Prior to 1982, any registered nurse candidate who failed any one test of the five part State Board Test Pool Examination, was not allowed to practice nursing until such time as all five tests were passed. Candidates who do not pass the comprehensive NCLEX examination must retake all four parts. There is no limit to the number of times a candidate may take the examination. The 1988 NCSBN Delegate Assembly authorized the investigation of computerized adaptive testing (CAT) for nursing licensure examinations. Large scale CAT field tests were conducted in July 1990 and February 1991. At the annual meeting in August 1991, delegates directed the NCSBN to proceed with implementation of CAT for future licensing examinations. Beta testing will begin in June 1993 with the implementation of CAT for all candidates scheduled for April 1994.

During the past several years, the pass-rate of graduates from Kentucky programs has been comparable to or above the national percentage pass-rate of all graduates who took the licensure examination for the first time.

For those candidates who were unsuccessful in passing the licensure examination, a Diagnostic Profile Report is prepared. This profile reports the candidates' performance in each test plan category according to the content requirements of the examination and indicates test plan areas for candidates to study in preparation for the next examination. The Diagnostic Profile should assist candidates in preparing to retake the examination and to achieve a passing result.

The Kentucky Board of Nursing has continued to follow the National Council of State Boards of Nursing procedure for responding to the needs of disabled candidates. This procedure provides for modification of the administration of the examination to accommodate candidates with disabilities in compliance with the U.S. Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the Americans With Disabilities Act.

One Kentucky nurse was selected by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing to be on the Panel of Content Experts during 1991-92. In addition, one staff person served on the NCSBN Administration of Examination Committee.

Finally, it should be noted that the past year has shown a sixteen percent (16%) increase in the number of candidates (first time writers) for licensure by examination as registered nurses, while the number of candidates (first time writers) for licensure by examination as licensed practical nurses increased by twelve percent (12%) in comparison to the previous year.

Registered Nurse Licensure by Examination

The Kentucky Nursing Laws state, "An applicant shall be required to pass a written examination in such subjects as the board may prescribe." This applies to applicants for registered nurse licensure and applicants for practical nurse licensure. The Kentucky Board of Nursing administers the National Council Licensure Examination to both registered nurse and licensed practical nurse applicants. Statistics on the number of registered nurse candidates writing for the first time and percent passing the examination follow.

The Kentucky Nursing Laws state, "An applicant shall be required to pass a written examination in such subjects as the board may determine." This applies to applicants for registered nurse licensure and applicants for practical nurse licensure. The Kentucky Board of Nursing administers the National Council Licensure Examination to both registered nurse and licensed practical nurse applicants. Statistics on the number of licensed practical nurse candidates writing for the first time and percent passing the examination follow.

Licensure by Endorsement

KRS 314.041(4) states, "The board may issue a license to practice nursing as a registered nurse to an applicant who has passed the state board test pool exam or an equivalent examination approved by the board and been licensed as a registered nurse under the laws of another state, territory or foreign country, if in the opinion of the board, the applicant is qualified to practice professional nursing in this state."

KRS 314.051(5) states, "The board may issue a license to practice as a licensed practical nurse to any applicant who has passed the state board test pool exam or an equivalent examination approved by the board and has been licensed or registered as a licensed practical nurse or a person licensed to perform similar services under a different title, under the laws of another state, territory or foreign country if, in the opinion of the board, the applicant meets the requirements for a licensed practical nurse in this state."

KRS 314.101(3) states, "A temporary work permit may be issued by the board to persons who have completed the requirements for, applied for and paid the fee for licensure by examination or endorsement. Temporary work permits shall be issued only for the length of time required to process applications for endorsement or to conduct and determine the results of examinations and shall not be renewed. No temporary work permit shall be issued to an applicant who has failed the licensure examination."

As shown in Table 10, during fiscal year 1991-92, 127 more RNs and 32 more LPNs left Kentucky than came to Kentucky. The Commonwealth of Kentucky continues to be a supplier state for nursing manpower.

Advanced Registered Nurse Practitioners

Since 1978, Kentucky Revised Statutes 314.131(1) empower the Board to register and designate those persons qualified to engage in advanced nursing practice. KRS 314.011(6) and (7) define "advanced registered nurse practitioner" and "advanced registered nursing practice," respectively. The Kentucky Board of Nursing registers qualified individuals as advanced registered nurse practitioners designated either as nurse anesthetist, nurse-midwife, nurse practitioner, or nurse clinical specialist. During the past year, 132 individuals were registered with the Board as advanced registered nurse practitioners. A summary report of advanced registered nurse practitioner registration is shown in Table 13.

Kentucky Nurse Licensees

The Kentucky Nursing Laws provide that, "The license of every person under the provisions of KRS 314 ... shall be renewed at least biennially ..." By administrative regulation 201 KAR 20:080, the Kentucky Board of Nursing has determined that the licensure period shall be November 1 to October 31. KRS 314.031 states, "It shall be unlawful for any person to call or hold himself out as or use the title of nurse or to practice or offer to practice as a nurse unless licensed under the provision of KRS 314 ..." Table 14 depicts licensure totals for the fiscal year.

KENTUCKY BOARD OF NURSING STATEMENT OF PHILOSOPHY

It is the philosophy of the Kentucky Board of Nursing that the regulation of the practice of nursing shall achieve public protection by ensuring the competency of licensees who provide nursing care. To that end, the regulation of nursing should be responsive to the changing health needs and priorities of the public by requiring that practitioners demonstrate competency in the application of knowledge, skills, and behavior to meet those needs and priorities. As public protection is the essential role of the Board, the public should have a voice in the action taken to promote its protection.

Licensure establishes an essential level of competency, and indicates that nurses share a common core of knowledge. As such, the purpose of licensure is to set standards for practice and education of individuals in order to protect the public from dishonest and incompetent practitioners. These standards are established in the Kentucky Nursing Laws and its attendant administrative regulations. Nursing practice and behavior inconsistent with these standards should lead to disciplinary action.

Critical elements of the regulation of nursing practice include a coherent, generally acceptable definition of nursing, as well as definitions of professional scope and accountability. These definitions should make explicit that the nurse is responsible and accountable for the practice of nursing according to individual preparation and experience, with nursing auxiliaries assisting under prescribed conditions. Further, the licensed nurse is responsible and accountable for continued professional learning throughout her/his career continuum.

Essential components of the regulation of prelicensure nursing education include sufficient qualified faculty and appropriate program curricula and clinical practice laboratories. The curricula should reflect the activities, functions, duties, and responsibilities of the practicing nurse. The clinical practice laboratories should allow prelicensure students opportunities to both generate new knowledge and demonstrate their practice abilities.

As the standards governing nursing practice, continuing education, and prelicensure education are established through the legislative process, the Board has a responsibility to maintain ongoing communication with the legislative branch of government. Concurrently, the complex and dynamic changes occurring in the health care delivery system require that effective communication be maintained with licensees and with local, state and national nursing organizations, health care providers and agencies, governmental units, and nursing education programs.

In summary, the Kentucky Board of Nursing believes that the protection of the public can best be accomplished through ensuring the competency of licensees who provide nursing care, and by establishing standards that allow for the fullest development of nursing practice, commensurate with its potential social contribution.

A statement on the mission and assumptions introduces the document and includes broad goals adopted by the Board.

STRATEGIC PLAN

The strategic plan includes three major parts:

Statement of broad goals.

Statement of components (strategic goals) for each broad goal.

Statement of strategic approaches to accomplish the broad goals and respective components.

OPERATIONAL PLAN

The operational plan further specifies the strategic plan by the addition of the following:

Major activities for strategic approaches

Responsible work body

Decision-making body

Target date

The Strategic Plan extends over a three to five year period; the Operational Plan extends over a two to three year period. The latter may need revision/updating annually while the former should be reviewed and updated at least biennially.

DEFINITIONS

Goal: A broad statement of outcome that contributes to the achievement of the mission.

LONG RANGE PLAN 1993-1997

MISSION

The mission of the Commonwealth of Kentucky Board of Nursing is to enforce public policy related to the safe and effective practice of nursing in the interest of public welfare. As a regulatory agency of state government, the Board of Nursing accomplishes this mission as authorized by Kentucky administrative regulations. Statutes and attendant the Board of Nursing licenses and registers accomplishing its aims, and advanced registered nurse practitioners, qualified nurses providerships for mandatory continuing education and prelicensure programs of nursing, enforces the Nursing Practice Act, and issues nursing practice opinions. - 3. Registered nursing practice will expand to include current scopes of advanced nursing practice.
- 4. Emphasis on determination of competency will continue.
- 5. Questioning of mandatory continuing education for validation of competency will increase.
- 6. Changes in educational requirements for licensure will occur.
- 7. Scope of nursing practice will expand for licensees.
- 8. Nursing curricula will change to reflect non-traditional delivery systems.
- 9. Prelicensure educational programs will require an internship/preceptorship component.
- 10. There will be an increased societal interest in the arena of infectious diseases.
- 11. The role of regulatory agencies will be affected by the 1991 Americans With Disabilities Act.
- 12. Geopolitical events will dictate new approaches to the credentialing of foreign candidates for professional and occupational licensure.

- 4. The need for education regarding issues surrounding the regulation of nursing will continue.
- 5. Kentucky nurses will gain national prominence.
- 6. More nurses will be in independent practice.
- 7. The number of nurses employed outside of hospitals will increase.
- 8. Increase in non-licensed persons performing nursing duties will continue.
- 9. Efforts to implement institutional licensure will resurface.
- Kentucky Legislature will consider reorganization of state government.
- 11. Inaccessability of health care for citizens will jeopardize public safety.
- 12. Corporate control of health care delivery systems will
